New venue for Chris Evans' summer festival

Cheshire's Oulton Park has been announced as the new venue for the northern leg of Chris Evans' CarFest. The three-day event, together with its sister festival in the south, brings together the Radio Two DJ's passion for fast cars, great music and fine food. Contemporary Arts Festival for Malvern

A new month-long festival which aims to bring the very latest in modern drama, music, dance, comedy and film to the town of Malvern has been announced. The 2013 Malvern Contemporary Arts Festival will take place at Malvern Theatres from Friday 22 March to Wednesday 17 April. The event will feature acrobatic theatrical troupe Ockham's Razor, comedian Andy Parsons, the National

Dance Company of Wales, performances of award-winning West End show The Pitman Painters, and August Wilson's Fences, an acclaimed American drama starring Lenny Henry in the lead role.



Heritage Lottery Fund behind Thinktank's latest venture

A new gallery featuring more than twenty interactive exhibits based around Birmingham's world-renowned manufacturing industry will be opened to the public this month. Largely funded by a £894,000 Heritage Lottery Fund grant - and forming part of the Made In Birmingham project - the We Made It Gallery at Thinktank in Millennium Point demonstrates how everyday goods - from raw material to finished products - are produced. Around twelve hundred objects from the city's manufacturing and natural science collections will be showcased in the new space, which opens its doors on 16 February.



Guess Who's coming to Brum?

Legendary rock band The Who are to perform iconic double album Quadrophenia in its entirety when they visit Birmingham in the summer. Released in 1973, Quadrophenia was the band's second rock opera (after Tommy) and went on to become one of the most influential albums in the history of rock music. The new concert version has been personally directed by Roger Daltrey. Focusing on the original album, it replaces the narrative used in previous stage incarnations with powerful imagery projected on an array of massive screens. The new show features The Who's founding members Roger Daltrey and Pete Townshend, who will be joined by Zak Starkey (drums), Pino Palladino (bass), Simon Townshend (guitar/backing vocals), John Corey (keyboards), Loren Gold (keyboards/backing vocals) and Frank Simes (musical director, keyboards/backing vocals). The Who's Quadrophenia And More tour hits the LG Arena in Birmingham on 28 June.

Something to Shout about...

The fourth Shout festival, celebrating the best of LGBT arts and queer culture in the Midlands, gets under way this month. Comedians Rosie Wilby, Claire Summerskill and Pam Ann are just a few of the well-known names to feature in this year's programme of events. Shout takes place at various venues across Birmingham - including mac, The Barber Institute, The Library

A major new £1million art collection is to open at Birmingham Museum & Art Gallery (BMAG) next month. Containing over sixty works by some of the world's most highly acclaimed artists, Metropolis: Reflections On The Modern City presents visions of urban life from around the globe, and features photographs, paintings, videos and sculptures. All of the included works were produced within the last decade, with several pieces being a response to different areas of Birmingham. Commenting on the new exhibition, Simon Cane, Interim Director of the Birmingham Museums Trust, said: "Birmingham Museum & Art Gallery is proving itself as a leading player in contemporary art in the UK. Metropolis is a great boost to the region's art scene, bringing some of the best international art to our doorsteps. We have been collecting these works for the past five years and it is fantastic to finally see the finished collection open to the public." Birmingham Stage Company announces record numbers

Birmingham Stage Company (BSC) has seen out its twentieth anniversary year on a high, with its Christmas show James And The Giant Peach breaking all previous box office records. More than forty thousand people will have attended the muchacclaimed show by the time it ends its twelve-week run at Birmingham's Old Rep Theatre on 2 February. Of BSC's success, founder and actor Neil Foster said, "When I started the company aged twenty-six I didn't dream that twenty years later we would be heading off to Hong Kong and Singapore with our shows after an amazing Christmas season. We're really looking to celebrating our twenty-first anniversary this September.'

Bonjour! from Motionhouse...

Leamington-based Motionhouse Dance - the team behind last year's acclaimed outdoor production The Voyage - is to present its show Traction to the people of France as part of the Marseille-Provence 2013
European Capital of Culture celebrations in May. The production, which was initially developed for the opening of the Spiceal Street development at Birmingham's Bullring, sees six Motionhouse dancers moving in unison with three JCB diggers in a high-voltage celebration of the powerful harmony of humans and machines.





David Tennant to return to the RSC

The Royal Shakespeare Company's 2013/14 winter season will see ex-Dr Who David Tennant making a welcome return to Stratford, to take the lead in a new version of Richard II. Shakespeare's powerful play of nobility and conflict is the first in a cycle of History plays to be directed by the company's new Artistic Director Gregory Doran. The production will see Tennant once again joining forces with Oliver Ford Davies, with whom he appeared in the RSC's much-acclaimed 2008 production of Hamlet.

Other highlights announced in Doran's first season as Artistic Director include the world premiere of Ella Hickson's Wendy And Peter Pan (the RSC's Christmas show for 2013/14) and adaptations of two award-winning novels - Hilary Mantel's Wolf Hall and Mike Poulton's Bring Up The Bodies - both of which will play in rep at the Swan Theatre.

Shropshire World Heritage Site beats India's Taj Mahal in international poll

The region's Ironbridge Gorge beat off some stiff opposition in a recent poll held by TripAdvisor. In what's described as 'the largest study of its kind ever conducted' - with more than a million traveller feedback forms received - the famous Shropshire visitor attraction was declared the most highly recommended UNESCO World Heritage site in the UK. On an international scale, the Gorge came second behind the Historic Ensemble of the Potala Palace in Lhasa, China, but ahead of the Egyptian Pyramids and India's Taj Mahal.

Delighted with the accolade, Professor Les Sparks, Chairman of the Ironbridge Gorge World Heritage Site Steering Group, said,

"This is a worthy tribute to the warm reception visitors receive from local businesses and residents of the Ironbridge Gorge, which complements the exceptional beauty and history of the area."



Lichfield Festival appoints new patron

Michael Fabricant, the long-standing Member of Parliament for Lichfield, is to join celebrated conductor Valery Gergiev in the prestigious role of Patron of the Lichfield Festival. Tara Fitzgerald

talks about her debut performance with the RSC...

With a long and distinguished theatrical career behind her, not to mention plenty of high-profile film and television work, it's maybe surprising that Tara Fitzgerald has never performed with the Royal Shakespeare Company. The Waking The Dead star is filling that significant gap in her CV this year, however, by starring as Hermione in a new Stratford production of The Winter's Tale. What's On caught up with her to find out more..

You're about to make your RSC debut; what does working with the company mean to you on a personal level?

Since my childhood it's always had a special place in my heart and I've always held the RSC in very high esteem. My stepfather, who's no longer alive and who pretty much brought me up, was a Shakespeare artist at the RSC. So as a child I was sort of surrounded by news of the company and the productions with which he was involved. Then there were the actors with whom he was friends and who'd come over for Sunday lunch at our house. There was always a sort of magic.

Obviously you've been an established actor for quite a while; why has it taken you so long to perform with the RSC?

I don't know, it's just how it's panned out. I guess it just hasn't been the right time before, but this is all very exciting. And it's great to be working with Lucy Bailey, who I think is a really innovative and strong director. She's very clear with her vision and very modern.

So how does Lucy's Winter's Tale differ from previous versions?

I'm not sure, as I've never seen The Winter's Tale performed on stage, so I don't have any previous ideas about how it should be. I knew the play a little because it's a bit of a set text at drama school and I'd read it then. I came back to it recently, and when this came up by coincidence, I decided I really wanted to have a crack at Hermione.

John Boden is providing the musical compositions. Have you heard any of them?

To my shame, I hadn't heard of him before. That says quite a lot about me, doesn't it? Where have I been? In the cultural wilderness, I think. I'm in the Sicilia section of the play, and John's work is primarily focused in the Bohemia section, so as I'm not performing, I get to watch the others. There's some lovely work, and the music is really beautiful. It's traditional with a twist.

Was becoming an actor something to which you'd always aspired?

Yes, pretty much. As a child I did, because it was something I was surrounded by. My great aunt was an actress. My mother's side of the family geared towards traditionalist acting, and theatre in general, and my aunty was a director. There've been a lot of strong women in our family who've gone into the business.

Do you see yourself as a strong character?

No, I don't think that I do. I think it's usually something that other people attribute to you. I don't know if I feel that strong. At the moment I just feel like I'm trying to leave myself open to the work.

You've got an impressive repertoire under your belt, so you must feel fairly confident about what you're able to achieve?

No, I wouldn't say that. I don't think it gets any easier. I think there are other things which come into play. Obviously over time you get to know a lot of people, or a lot more people, which gives you some sort of fortitude, but actually - in my experience anyway - every time I come to something new, I feel like I'm starting again. Sometimes I forget I'm in my forties and that I'm one of the older members of the group. I often feel as if I've just come out of drama school.

What was your first big breakthrough?

My first ever job! I was in such an unusual position of having just left drama school and going straight into doing a movie, Hear My Song. I was getting ready to do public theatre, and in those days getting hold of an Equity card wasn't a given. I just didn't imagine I'd land a plumb role like that. That was an incredible experience, a really special time - everything really came together and everybody had a lovely time. We were filming in Ireland, which has its own sort of magic.

Has it been an easy ride since then?

Some of it has and some of it hasn't. Like life, you have to have your ups and downs. I guess the thing about being older is that you recognise you have to have the lay periods in order to have time to do other things, like meeting new people and going travelling. In the past, when I've just worked constantly, my perspective has become quite narrow. I need to be able to go out and bring things back to what I'm doing. I think the more I go on, the more I realise the key is managing your time when you're not working, and keeping your head together during those periods, which can be a challenge.

As you've got older, has your criteria for accepting roles changed?

No, it hasn't. I know in my waters if something is a good thing to do. It's normally dependent on the same factors, mainly the director and the quality of the writing.

You alternate between stage and screen. Which do you ultimately prefer?

They're challenging in different ways. To me, they're very different disciplines. Filming is about small bursts of intense focus and then a lot of waiting around, keeping yourself ready and being able to get back to the place where you were. You're not so much in command of what you're doing, and it can be dependent on so many other variable conditions. Then there's the after-processs, the post-production, which can change things radically. With theatre, it's up to you, and you're responsible in a different way. Filming is quite isolating and you're pretty much on your own. You're often in your own little box - you come out and do some work,

and then you go back and sit in your little box again. Theatre's much more about the company, obviously; about being part of that and about being responsible to that company and to the moment. You get a very particular buzz performing to a live audience, so I guess it has to be theatre.

You've worked in classical and contemporary theatre - are different disciplines required for each?

For me, no. Every piece of work throws up its own problems. It can be about discovering the style, how far you can go with the performance, and whether it's naturalistic or not. I suppose in that regard they can be different, but it's so important to create the world for yourself, which with filming you don't. It's all laid out for you on set, whereas in theatre you have to create it.

What's been the most challenging role you've undertaken?

I feel the most challenging role is the one I'm about to undertake, but ultimately it's all about getting into the right place in your head.

You had to deal with some fairly gruesome scenes when filming Waking The Dead and The Body Farm. Was that quite challenging?

No, I really like all that. I like the gore, but I don't like watching it back, hence I couldn't watch a lot of Waking The Dead. I can't handle it. For some reason, being in it and working with it is easier for me. I quite like getting my hands dirty, getting stuck into things and learning new things. One of my favourite aspects of the work I do is the research; and that's why I like theatre, because you have a period of discovery in rehearsal.

What new skills did you have to learn for those two series?

Obviously I didn't have to learn anything properly - I didn't ever forget that I wasn't actually a forensic pathologist! I wouldn't make that mistake, but I learned stuff about entomology. Before the series, I didn't really know anything about insects, gestation of life and all those sort of things, but I had brilliant help from the people around me. I needed to feel like I did know what I was talking about in order to make it credible. My partner says actors have very wide knowledge but very little depth; a bit like a little puddle. I'm a little puddle, I think, in terms of my knowledge of things.

Waking The Dead was primetime TV. Do you regard it as the highlight of your career to date?

It was one of them, certainly. I loved working with that group of people and we had a really good time. I found it very inspiring and exciting. It really challenged me in lots of ways.

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What's been the lowest point of your career?

I don't think I know my actual lowest point, but there was a period of about eighteen months in my thirties where I didn't work; that was difficult.

Is the security of the profession something you worry about?

It's a brilliant job but also a funny job. You don't necessarily progress in the way you might do in a normal company, where you work your way up the ranks. It doesn't work that way in this business; things fluctuate all the time and something can happen overnight. That's all part of the allure, of course - the fact that your life can change on a dime.

Do you measure your success by the roles you're offered?

Yes, to a certain extent. I recently went to see a brilliant panto with these really good actors in it - I mean really, really good. They were making such bold choices, and it was funny, it was adult and it was so committed. They were all doing such brilliant work, and it made me realise just how lucky I am, because I'm no more talented than those actors. Luck also has a lot to do with it.

If you could change one rule in theatreland, what would it be?

To make it cheaper, which in turn would make it accessible to more people. I think people and companies are making efforts to do that, but it suffers from being so rarified. It really doesn't have to be, though, because there's something for everybody. There's

such good theatre in this country.

Do you think theatre is, in some respects, still elitist?

I think some people are still slightly in awe of it, and some people may be a little afraid of it. The reaction you get from some people in relation to Shakespeare, for instance, is that they don't understand it, and that breeds fear.

So should more companies look to simplify Shakespeare's text in a bid to make it more accessible?

I don't think you have to simplify the text as long as it's presented with clarity and commitment. That's certainly something we're working towards with The Winter's Tale, and something we're hoping to achieve.

Has Hollywood ever beckoned?

I went over there for a couple of things in my twenties but it didn't work out. I think you find where you're comfortable as you get older, and I've always been more drawn to European films, although I do admire American filmmaking enormously. I admire their hands-on approach and their openness. Everyone has an opportunity. It's very much, "If you want to have a go, then have a go, and if it's any good, we'll get behind you". I think it's harder in this country, because it's more hierarchical. English is my only language, and although I've been drawn to Europe, I haven't worked there, as I don't know any other languages. I can't put my finger on it, but there's something that makes European films a lot

more interesting. Also, the way in which women in the industry are treated is much better. In France, Spain and Italy, actresses are really admired, and there are still parts for older women that aren't just playing mums. It's a cliche but it's true.

If you had to switch careers, what would you choose to do?

I've always been interested in architecture, which would be a very different career route and involve many years of study.

Is it an interest which spills over into your spare time?

I love going to cities and exploring architecture. I don't know if architects and actors are of the same ilk, but there's something about leaving something indelible; leaving your mark. Obviously a building is there for as long as it can stand, and actors' performances can travel through time like that too.

Looking back over the past twenty years, is there anything you wish you'd done differently?

If I'd changed one thing it would then have impacted on a whole chain of events, which would have meant a different life, and I've liked my life. I'm glad I'm living this life. So no, I wouldn't change a thing.

Harry Hill back on tour and grappling with a giant sausage...

In his brand new show, Sausage Time Live, which is coming to a theatre near you very soon, the daft, floppy-collared Harry Hill dazzles on every level. For instance, the show pledges to offer absolute proof that God exists, provides a section exclusively for Tongans, furnishes audiences with a summary of Harry's nan's latest ailments, showcases the legendary Stouffer the Cat and proffers a debut solo stand-up spot to Gary, Harry's son from his first marriage and best known for his role as Alan Sugar in Harry Hill's TV Burp...

During the course of this captivating show, we're also promised performances by the show band, The Harrys, expert whistler-of-chart-hits grandson Sam, and an all-singing, all-dancing finale.

Oh, and a giant sausage. What's not to like? The critics have already been queueing up to lavish praise on Harry's show. Dominic Cavendish in The Daily Telegraph writes that, "Hill constructs a world of his own crazed invention. The effect is like being repeatedly tickled: he wears you down until you're giggling like a merry idiot." Mike Ward in the Daily Star goes for a more simple assessment: "The man oozes genius." So what other delights might we expect in Sausage Time Live, Harry's first stand-up show since Hooves in 2007? One thing we should anticipate above all else is a wonderful sense of silliness.

Sporting his trademark look of gleaming bald pate, thick spectacles, big-collared white shirt and dark suit, complete with a top pocket stuffed with pens and lapels lined with badges, Harry is tucking into a quiche and salad at a south London arts centre in the run-up to the tour. Crackling with charisma, he is a rare example of a comedian who's just as charming and funny offstage as he is on it. An hour in his presence simply flies by.

Harry, whose TV Burp on ITV1 has been described by Peter Kay as "the only thing on TV that actually makes me laugh out loud", begins by declaring that "there's never a serious agenda to my comedy. I use a lot of slapstick and a lot of silly wordplay and puns. The show doesn't have an overall theme. It's just a load of silly stuff." The comedian has been doing lots of warmup shows and has relished the experience of performing live once again. "I've loved it," he says. "It gives you such a buzz. Hearing laughter is such an exciting feeling. Stand-up offers you freedom. When you do a TV show, there's a very long time between writing a joke and getting a laugh. You have to write a script, have meetings, explain to the producer why it's funny and shouldn't be cut, and explain to the prop maker what the prop should look like. Then you turn up and the prop is wrong. The new prop turns up just ten minutes before filming, but even though it gets a laugh, the producer still wants to cut it. It's such a laborious process.

"On the other hand, stand-up is so immediate. You can have an idea in the morning and get a laugh for it in the evening. No one else can tell you what to do, apart from the audience. The audience is the ultimate arbiter."

The comedian, who gave up his career as a doctor to concentrate on stand-up two decades ago, expands on the natural high that performing live comedy gives him. "At its best, stand-up is like a car race. You're driving along and accelerating as the audience is laughing. It gets to the point where you're on such a roll that almost

anything you say is funny. You're not even thinking about it. It's just automatic.

"It's like you're constantly changing up a gear. You can even stop suddenly and then speed off again. It's like you're driving the audience. It's an amazing feeling of power. You can understand why some performers go off the rails!

"For that period when you're on stage, everything else has gone and you're completely living in the moment. That's what you're aiming for in life, to be absolutely in the moment. You're not worried about the future or the past. It's quite difficult to achieve. It's the same effect as meditation or Class A drugs probably!"

Touring with Sausage Time Live represents a return to his roots for Harry. "Stand-up is what I've always wanted to do. It's what I gave up medicine to do all those years ago. It's the bedrock of everything I do."

The comedian, who's won multiple BAFTA and British Comedy Awards, goes on to reveal one of the major ideas that will run through Sausage Time Live.

"I have a whole shtick about Broken Britain. It's a mickey-take of Middle England paranoia. I pick on someone in the audience and accuse them of putting their rubbish in their neighbour's wheelie bin. I get really angry about it.

"Then I accuse someone else of throwing away a coffee cup without disposing of the grounds first. I extrapolate the consequences of their actions, which are that a baby ends up on a ventilator. By the end of the show, I've completely lost my rag!

"We're paranoid about this country falling apart because it is, but there's nothing we can do about it. It's finally caught up with us. I'm not saying why. I'm just taking the mickey out of that overreaction. I get furious with the audience for their misdemeanours because there is something really funny about people getting angry over something so trivial. "We're obsessed with dividing up our rubbish and putting it in different bags. That's so annoving. In one local borough, they

annoying. In one local borough, they distribute plastic bags for you to put your recycled rubbish into. Any system that relies on plastic bags for recycling is obviously flawed."

The comic, who's married with three daughters, explains why he's been away from stand-up for so long. "TV Burp took up so much of my time. I wanted to tour, but I couldn't do it to my family. Even when I was at home, I was having to watch TV all the time and was mentally somewhere else. Eventually with TV Burp, I felt we were aetting disinterested, which is the kiss of death. It was a great stress watching TV for hours and hours each week. You can do that for six weeks, but not for weeks on end. "Also over an eleven-year period, we felt we'd done all the jokes we could do about every single show. How many more jokes are there to make about EastEnders? And by the end, pseudo-documentaries like The Only Way Is

Essex were doing the jokes for us."
So Harry decided to quit while he was ahead. "I thought, 'We'd better get out now'. By then, no amount of money could have persuaded me to stay. On our final show, we had a knitted character, Wagbo, and Heather's death on EastEnders, which was a complete gift for us. I thought, 'It won't get any better than this'.

"At the end of that last show, all the production team were crying, but I went back to my dressing room and felt like a weight had been lifted. The closest equivalent was when I gave up medicine. When I drove out of Ashford Hospital for the last time, I had this great feeling of euphoria. I still feel that I'm not missing TV Burp in the slightest."


He admits that some audience members come along to Sausage Time Live thinking it's going to be TV Burp Live. "But it's not. I wouldn't give in to that pressure. It's a slippery slope when you start giving people what you think they want. You end up popular and wealthy, and we wouldn't want that!"

Harry closes by underlining how much he's revelling in being back on the live stage. "I love it, and the audiences so far seem to be loving it, too. They particularly love slapstick. It's in our DNA. It's a childlike thing. Why do people enjoy You've Been Framed when it's really the same thing every week? "I've done it for a long time now, and I think it's funnier now I'm older. It's more incongruous and humiliating. The older you are, and the higher your status, the less likely you are to be rolling around on the floor with a giant sausage!"

Did you know?

- Harry's real name is Matthew Hall, but he changed it to Harry Hill because he thought it sounded more "showbiz".
- Although Harry was born in Surrey, he spent the majority of his childhood in Hong Kong.
- Despite quitting the medical profession in 1990, Harry is still a registered surgeon.
- Harry's TV Burp has previously won two British Comedy Awards and a BAFTA.
- Whilst doing his new stand-up tour, Harry is also developing The X Factor Musical alongside Simon Cowell, which is set to tour at the end of the year.

Sheila Reid

Benidorm actress enthuses about her latest role...

Best known for playing the sharp-tongued Madge Harvey in ITV's hugely successful comedydrama series Benidorm, Scottish-born actress Sheila Reid this month makes her way to the Midlands, joining Julian Glover and Nichola McAuliffe in Nichola's critically acclaimed drama Maurice's Jubilee. What's On recently caught up with her to discuss her new role - and to find out about her experience of playing opposite the legendary Laurence Olivier!

You're about to star as Helena in Maurice's Jubilee. What was it about the character that first attracted you to the role?

Helena's got so many layers to her. She reveals so many different emotions and there's the potential for lots of development. She's funny, sad, tender and loving, but she's also a strong woman who's had to deal with a lot of disappointment in her life. I suppose she's a bit like a diamond - there are so many different facets to her. When I read the script she just leapt off the page at me.

You've said she's a multi-faceted character. Is there anything about the role

that you've found particularly challenging? Yes, she has a great moment, a moment of truth, where she has to dig really deeply into herself. It sounds a bit poncey, doesn't it, but it's not; it's true. She has to find forgiveness, and it's quite a tough journey. She's also in denial about her husband's illness, and it's quite hard to portray characters who are having to put a lot of stuff on top, to make people believe that they're different. On the surface she's great, a real social butterfly who can talk the hind leg off a donkey. She's quite bright and light, but underneath there are great chasms of feelings and depth. That's the challenge, really - to find those

areas; but the discovery is what I've really enjoyed the most - and I'm still discovering.

Do you see the role evolving the more you perform it?

Yes I do, and what's interesting - because we did it at the Edinburgh Festival, which was a great success - is that it's a lovely role to revisit. That's always the mark of good writing - if, when you come back to a play, you discover more in it, and that's exactly what we've done. Helena's character has been expanded since we played Edinburgh, because in Edinburgh you only have ninety minutes. The turnover is so tremendous and

it's completely frantic. There's a different show every ninety minutes; that's all you've got and then you have to be out. So in this lovely tour we're doing, there's room for expansion, and room to shake our shoulders and let it breathe more.

You're performing alongside Julian Glover, who you've worked with before. What was your reaction when you realised you'd be reunited in this production?

He's completely gorgeous and brilliant. I couldn't be more pleased. I really think he's a hugely fine actor, and we're really lucky to have him on board.

Has it made it easier performing alongside someone you've worked with previously?

Of course. It's lovely, and we know each other as friends too, which is also lovely. The three of us are ridiculously close, so it's absolutely gorgeous. I knew Nichola vaguely before, but we'd never worked together. I'd seen her work and admired it from afar, but now the three of us are just like peas in a pod and very happy working together. This play really requires a certain kind of intimacy and trust and generosity and spirit. It just beams out from both of them, and it's a real delight.

Do you imagine playing Helena night in, night out will be an emotionally draining experience?

Yes, I think it will be. It's something I'm slightly nervous about because we've got a lot of matinees as well as evening performances, which we didn't have in Edinburgh. But we'll have the mornings to recover, when I can leap up, do my yoga and get set again. I do think energy breeds energy; the more you do, the more you're able to do. Well, I'm certainly hoping that proves to be the case, anyway!

You've mentioned yoga. Do you have a pre-performance routine?

Yes I do, but it doesn't involve yoga - I just do that in the morning. Before a show I concentrate on vocal exercises. A lot of the venues we're playing are quite large and this is a very intimate play; it can be quite challenging to find a vocal balance that allows you to reach the back of the stalls yet at the same time retain the intimacy between the three of us.

You're well known for playing the domineering Madge in Benidorm. How much influence did you have in terms of the creation of that character?

The writing dictates the direction you go. It's inevitable, because that's the material that you're working with. With Madge, as with Helena, I had to discover the person behind the lines - why she says the things that she does, and what makes her behave in the way that she behaves. As with Helena, Madge has had a pretty tough time, what with all her horrible husbands and the deaths of those husbands, and having seven girls, six of whom have deserted her. It may not be entirely their fault, because I have to admit she doesn't have the most attractive qualities, but she's a survivor, isn't she? She's had it tough and that's what she is.

What do you think is her least endearing quality?

How long have you got? I think she's a bit

mean pinching her grandson's money. She's always nicking his money, and going off and having her nails done.

You must have so much fun filming it...

We have huge, huge fun. We really do. Madge is a wonderful character and it's a lovely cast as well.

On the flipside, have you ever worried playing a character like Madge might have a negative effect on the type of roles you're offered?

Yeah, and I think that in certain instances it's probably been to my detriment. People think, "Oh we'd better not put her in that serious play because people might just see her as Madge and not believe in her as a different character". I'm hoping that my role in the Christmas special of Call The Midwife - which was a wonderful part, and one which received a really positive reaction - might hit that problem on the head. But playing Madge has led to something good as well, in that I've been chosen to play wonderful characters in Channel Four's Psychobitches. What a challenge I've been given there!

In Psychobitches you're working alongside very well-known comedians such as Katherine Tate and Katy Brand...

Yeah, I know - and I'm not a comic, so that's another taboo broken, which is lovely.

You say you're not a comic, but there's a comedic side to Madge which is very entertaining...

Yeah, she does have that, but she's still in a drama. It's not like getting up and doing your own stuff, like Katy Brand and a lot of the actresses in Psychobitches. They all come from that kind of stable. Then again, there are others who don't - like Samantha Spiro, for instance.

So has Psychobitches been a learning curve?

Most definitely. I've been so lucky with the characters I've been given in the show. I actually met Mother Theresa, so I knew what she was like. I also had to do Margot Fonteyn, and I always wanted to be a ballet dancer, so that's another good thing there. Then there was Betty Ford, who enjoys a glass or two, and I've been known to enjoy a glass in my past. You can always search into your own murky background and find clues.

You say you have an association with those characters, so did you have a say in terms of who you played?

Absolutely not. I was just thrilled to bits that I was thought of.

What was your most memorable moment filming Psychobitches?

I think it was probably trying to dance as an eighty-year-old Margot Fonteyn, whose limbs had lost a lot of their elasticity!

Were there many re-takes? Quite a few!

You have a very long and successful career behind you. What's been the key to that success?

Tenacity, hard work, the love of it, loving the process of discovering different characters, how they tick and why they behave as they

do; the company of other actors and enjoying going to work more than not going to work; being optimistic and hopeful and looking forward. I feel very lucky to have a job I want to get up for every morning.

What's your fondest moment of life in the theatre?

Possibly playing opposite Laurence Olivier in a play in which I had to kneel down and grasp him around the knees because I was in love with him. My wig got caught in his watch chain, and in trying to extricate myself - well, you can imagine what it looked like...

If you were asked to offer advice to someone entering the profession, what would it be?

Just to learn to accept rejection, because you'll get a lot of that, but to keep your face and spirit alive. Also to look outwards, not inwards. It's interesting, really, because the more you look out, the more you will be seen, the more ammunition you have to work with. I think that's important. So be interested in other people and other things, everything around you.

Looking back on your career, is there anything you'd have done differently?

I'm very bad at networking and I think if you really want to get to the top, you have to be good at pushing yourself and being seen in the right places. I don't think I'm good at that. I think it's because I come from a Presbyterian-Scottish background; I tend to let things just happen, as opposed to making them happen. I think maybe you need to be more proactive than I've been.

Back to Madge - are there any plans for another series of Benidorm?

There are, yes. We go out at the end of March, and we'll be there for April, May and June. So I'll be back in another bathing suit and the bright orange make-up, but having the time of my life.

It must be fun getting ready for that?

I just adore all the ridiculous clothes I get to wear. Talk about mutton dressed as lamb! There's a side of me which really loves that. The awful thing is, at the end of the shoot, they say, "Do you want any of your clothes?", and I think, "Oh, well I might have that...", and when I get home, after being in London for two weeks, I think to myself, "What am I doing?", and they all end up going to the charity shop!

Have you ever been tempted to use any of Madge's traits in your personal life?

Well, she says what she thinks, and, again, in my own personal upbringing, we were always told to think really hard before saying anything, to the point that you'd be so busy thinking, you'd forget what you were going to say in the first place. But her honesty is refreshing, even though I think it could be tempered with perhaps a little more gentleness.

Sheffield-born singer, songwriter and musician Paul Carrack has enjoyed a long and distinguished career, performing in his fair share of bands down the years, including such heavyweights ensembles as Ace, Squeeze, Mike And The Mechanics and Roxy Music. He's also paid his dues as a session and touring musician, and can point to his fair share of solo success too. Oh, and he's no slouch when it comes to songwriting either, with Tom Jones, The Eagles and Jools Holland all having benefitted from his remarkable talent.



Nerina Pallot

Exquisitely crafted and beautifully sung pop
songs are Nerina Pallot's stock-in-trade. The
talented singer-songwriter has been nominated for a Brit Award and an Ivor Novello
Award during a Kate Bush-inspired career

credits for artists such as Kylie Minogue and
Diana Vickers. Nerina's well known and much
admired for her passionate approach not only
to life but also her career, which she views as

a marathon rather than a sprint; so much so, in fact, that her stated aim is to die on stage at the age of ninety-five while performing her onewoman review show. ...It's always good to have ambition.



Richard Hawley

The Assembly, Leamington Spa, Thurs 21 February

Away from his work as a solo artist. Richard Hawley is best known for his time in the Britpop band Longpigs, and for spending some time with his mate Jarvis Cocker in Pulp. As a solo performer, the guitarist and singer-songwriter has released seven albums, the latest of which was last year's Standing At The Sky's Edge, a work that's been described as 'channelling elements of psychedelia, space rock and ragas with heavy riffs and raw, visceral guitar solos'. Charting at number three Richard's highest ever entry - and receiving more than its fair share of praise across the board, the album offered irrefutable evidence, were any to be needed, that Hawley is an artist who's very much at the peak of his powers.



Kaiser Chiefs

Civic Hall, Wolverhampton, Fri 22 February

Indie pop boys from Leeds, the Kaiser Chiefs' ascent into the public consciousness was rapid indeed, with charismatic front man Ricky Wilson liking to enliven their gigs with a spot of crowd-surfing. On the whole, they give the general impression of not being able to believe their luck - which makes them all the more endearing, of course - while clever lyrics, driving guitars and a knack for a memorable chorus place them very much in the tradition of The Jam. Drummer Nick Hodgson quit the Kaisers in late 2012 to concentrate on other projects, meaning that this latest Midlands gig sees the band entering an exciting new era.

The Jacksons

National Indoor Arena, Birmingham, Tues 26 February

Having rarely performed together over the last three decades, it's hardly surprising that The Jacksons' decision to reunite for a new tour has resulted in plenty of publicity and no shortage of ticket sales. At the height of their success, The Jacksons were, of course, The Jackson Five, with solo-superstar-in-the-making Michael joining Jackie, Jermaine, Marlon and Tito to score numerous worldwide hits with songs such as I Want You Back, ABC, The Love You Save and I'll Be There. Peddling a unique brand of soul punk, the brothers continued to enjoy success even after Five became four with Michael's departure, cutting their final album together in 1989. They perform in Birmingham as part of their comeback Unity tour.

Justin Currie

Artrix, Bromsgrove, Sun 24 February

Citing Nick Cave, Crowded House and Mark Lanegan as his major influences, Del Amitri founder member and front man Justin Currie has garnered an impressive reputation as a solo performer, his hauntingly dark urban ballads presenting a winning blend of strong imagery and powerful storytelling. The Scottish

singer-songwriter's output is far from prolific, with only two albums recorded since he went solo in the early twenty-first century, but if you're an admirer of lovelorn country-tinged pop, Currie's well worth a look when he stops off in the region for this Bromsgrove date.



Bellowhead

Warwick Arts Centre, Coventry, Sat 16 February

This eleven-piece group merge folk, jazz, funk, classical and world music influences with a twist of English music hall. Between them, they play more than twenty instruments in a unique mix, and have picked up an impressive seven BBC Radio Two Awards in recognition of their quality. High energy and highly talented, the band are Artists-in-Residence at the Southbank Centre, and last year released fourth album Broadside to great acclaim.

Caravan

The Robin, Bilston

Emerging from the now-legendary Canterbury music scene, Caravan became a vital part of the late-1960s/early-1970s underground movement. Although real commercial success eluded the group, they've nonetheless succeeded in retaining a considerable following. Gigs these days are infrequent, but this year they're back on the road for a short and well-received UK tour, to celebrate the fortieth anniversary of their classic album For Girls That Grow Plump In The Night. Despite four-fifths of the band being under the weather, they appeared to be enjoying themselves at this recent Bilston gig. Original member, singer and guitarist Pye Hastings, whose whimsical choirboy vocals are integral to the band's sound, had to sing an octave lower on the night, due to the effects of a virus, but the group still managed to deliver a magical set. Comprising a very English mix of folk, classical, jazz, jazz-prog and rock, with a sense of humour never far away, highlights included L'Auberge de Sanglia/A Hunting We Shall Go, Nine Feet Underground, In The Land Of Grey And Pink, and Golf Girl - the latter featuring a spoons solo by the superb Geoff Richardson (viola, flute and guitar). Let's just hope that it's not another ten years before Caravan tour again. David Davies



Manchester Concert Orchestra Featuring Amore

Symphony Hall, Birmingham, Fri 15 February

Former Royal College of Music students Victoria Gray, Monica McGhee, David Webb and Peter Braithwaite have certainly garnered plenty of praise since they started performing together as Amore. Recently formed, the ensemble came about when a tutor from the Royal College popped into Starbucks for a coffee and fortuitously overheard two Warner Bros executives discussing their vision of a 'fresh, commercial and totally British classical group'. The tutor immediately thought of four of his prize students and, after a few phone calls, all parties met, a sixalbum deal was agreed, and the rest, as they say, is history (well, history in the making, anyway!). This month sees the young quartet make their Symphony Hall debut, joining the Manchester Concert Orchestra for an evening of romantic classics that includes Tchaikovsky's Romeo And Juliet, Verdi's Prelude to Act One from La Traviata and Bizet's Duet from The Pearl Fishers.

We take a look back at one hundred years of the Birmingham Repertory Theatre...

Key dates in the Rep's history

1879: Barry Jackson was born.

1913: Birmingham Repertory Theatre opens on Station Street. Founded and financed by Barry Jackson, the small elegant playhouse seating just four hundred-and-sixty-four is the first new purpose-built British repertory theatre.

1916: Eden Phillpott's rural comedy The Farmer's Wife is destined to become a major popular success over two decades

1919: John Drinkwater's play Abraham Lincoln becomes the first Rep production to be presented in London. In Birmingham, a nineteen-year-old Noel Coward appears in the Jacobean comedy The Knight Of The Burning Pestle.

1923: Shakespeare's Cymbeline, directed by HK Ayliff,

becomes the first production of Shakespeare to be staged in modern dress.

1925: Barry Jackson is knighted for services to theatre.

1926: Laurence Olivier and Ralph Richardson make their professional stage debuts in Birmingham.

1929 - 1937: Sir Barry Jackson becomes director of the Malvern Festival.

1931: A pioneering series of radio dramas are broadcast from the Old Rep Theatre.

1934: At Christmas the première of 1066 And All That becomes the greatest financial hit The Rep has ever had. During the run, Sir Barry agrees to transfer his interest to a Trust and effectively gives The Rep to the City of Birmingham as the Birmingham Repertory Theatre Limited.

1935: Gift of the theatres to Birmingham City Council.

1940: The Rep's wardrobe building in Hinkley Street is destroyed by incendiary bombs. Thirty years of sets and costumes go up in flames. In December, the theatre closes.

1945: Peter Brook makes his directorial debut with Man And Superman by George Bernard Shaw.

1946: Sir Barry Jackson becomes Artistic Director of the Shakespeare Memorial Theatre in Stratford.

1950: Alan Badel, John Neville, Eric Porter and Donald Pleasance are all in the Birmingham company.

1954: The first Arts Council grant of £500 is awarded to The Rep.

1955: Sir Barry Jackson is given the Freedom of the City.

1957: Albert Finney plays Henry V.

1961: On 3 April Sir Barry Jackson dies.

1963: The Rep celebrates its

fiftieth birthday with a ten-week Shakespeare festival. Derek Jacobi plays Henry V, Troilus in Troilus And Cressida and Aaron the Moor in Titus Andronicus. By June, Swinging '60s icon Julie Christie is a member of the company.

1965: Peter Dews becomes Artistic Director.

1967: New Artistic Director Peter Dews directs a modern Carnaby Street-style As You Like It, with Brian Cox, Timothy Dalton and Oliver Ford-Davies in the cast.

1970: The Old Rep closes on 16 December with a final production of 1066 And All That. Construction of the new Rep building on Broad Street gets under way.

1971: The new Rep opens on Broad Street with a heroically-proportioned stage and a fanshaped auditorium which seats nine hundred-and-one. In October, Princess Margaret



attends a Royal Gala performance of First Impressions, a musical version of Jane Austen's Pride And Prejudice featuring Patricia Routledge as Mrs Bennett.

1972: The Rep's Studio Theatre opens.

1976: Clive Perry becomes Artistic Director.

1977: In the Studio David Edgar's play Mary Barnes is given its world première with a cast which includes Patti Love, Simon Callow, Timothy Spall and Roger Allam.

1978: At Christmas Worzel Gummidge - by Keith Waterhouse and Willis Hall, based on the popular children's television series - is a huge success in Birmingham and transfers to London starring Jon Pertwee as the lovable scarecrow Worzel and Una Stubbs as his disdainful yet beloved Aunt Sally.

1982: At Christmas Noelle Gordon, well-known from the Midlands television soap Crossroads, gives a barnstorming central performance in a lavish production of the musical Call Me Madam.

1987: John Adams becomes Artistic Director.

1988: Kenneth Branagh and his new Renaissance Company take over the Studio to present three plays by Shakespeare directed by celebrated actors. As You Like It is directed by Geraldine McEwan. Judi Dench directs Much Ado About Nothing, and Derek Jacobi directs Branagh as Hamlet.

1992: Bill Alexander becomes Artistic Director.

1993: For Christmas, new Artistic Director Bill Alexander strikes gold when he directs the first performances of The Snowman, based on Raymond Briggs' best-selling children's story.

1994: Gwenda Hughes' production of the exuberant Caribbean musical Once On This Island wins an Olivier Award for Best Musical after it transfers to London.

1995: The appointment of The Rep's first Literary Manager, Ben Payne, signals the growing emphasis on the development of new plays.

1996: The Rep's creative partnership with the British Asian company Tamasha peaks with the première of Ayub Khan Din's play East Is East, which goes on to achieve national and international success on stage and screen.

1997: The Rep wins a Lottery grant of over £5.5million to enable much-needed refurbishment and repair, especially to the main auditorium.

1998: Bill Alexander directs the première of Bryony Lavery's play Frozen. With Josie Lawrence, Anita Dobson and Tom Georgeson, it is a major critical success and is subsequently

revived at the National Theatre.The Studio is relaunched as The Door, dedicated exclusively to new writing.

2000: The Millennium year is celebrated with nine new plays at The Rep. Alexander's final autumn season includes a double bill of Twelfth Night and Hamlet, and Indhu Rubasingham directs an exuberant version of the Indian epic The Ramayana.

2001: Jonathan Church becomes Artistic Director.

2002: Jonathan Church directs Steinbeck's Of Mice And Men, starring Matthew Kelly and George Costigan, to rave reviews and sold-out signs. The production transfers to the West End and Matthew Kelly is awarded the Laurence Olivier Award for Best Actor.

2002: Wallop Mrs Cox, a boisterous musical play about Birmingham's Bull Ring market traders with a cast of community actors, sells out at The Rep in July and receives standing ovations.

2004: Gurpreet Kaur Bhatti's play Behzti (Dishonour) receives its world premiere. After thirteen performances the run is forced to end following public protests by members of the Sikh community.

2005: Rachel Kavanaugh becomes Artistic Director.

2008: The Rep welcomes plans for a joint development of the theatre with the new Library of Birmingham.

2009: Dennis Kelly's electrifying new play, Orphans, is awarded a prestigious 2009 Fringe First Award and a Herald Angel Award. Also, East Is East, the BAFTA award-winning comedy, returns to Birmingham Repertory Theatre in a new production, this time in the Main House.

2010: Graffiti artist Mohammed Ali is commissioned by The Rep to develop Writing On The Wall, a one-night-only aerosol art and spoken word performance marking the closure of The Rep's set design and construction workshops.

2011: The Rep's building closes for two years as part of the Library of Birmingham development. The Rep presents its first off-site programme.

2013: Roxanna Silbert becomes Artistic Director.

2013: After more than three thousand plays and over fifty thousand performances, The Rep celebrates a century of theatre on 15 February at the Old Rep Theatre on Station Street, its original home.

2013: Birmingham Repertory
Theatre on Broad Street reopens on 3 September, with a
new three hundred-seat Studio
Theatre to complement its
existing two auditoria, new set
design and construction
workshops, dressing rooms and
rehearsal rooms.

How it all started...

The Birmingham Rep began life on 15 February 1913 when Barry Jackson, the son of a Birmingham merchant, opened the theatre he'd built on Station Street (now known as the Old Rep). In the years that followed, the venue staged a wide-ranging programme of theatrical endeavours, with Jackson taking his plays out into the city's parks and also being responsible for the first ever

presentation of Shakespeare in modern dress (Cymbeline in 1923). Jackson also established a theatre school, and, in the process of all this innovation, garnered for his venue a reputation as one of the best theatres in the world. The Rep shifted to its current site on Broad Street in 1971, to a newly built theatre with a stage of epic proportions and a democratic auditorium with no balconies, pillars or boxes. Everyone shares the same space and everyone gets a great view.

With work on the city's new library, sited next to the Rep, now nearing completion, the theatre is gearing up for its September re-opening. The autumn/winter programme for 2013/14 will be announced at the gala performance of I Was A Rat! on 15 February.

Birmingham REP reveals artists for new initiative

The names of eighteen regional artists chosen to take part in a year-long programme designed to forge a new generation of theatre-makers have been revealed.

REP Foundry - an initiative put together by The Rep's new artistic director Roxana Silbert - aims to discover and promote the West Midlands' most promising talent. It will be made up of six writers, six directors and six theatre-makers, all of whom will receive mentoring and professional support from staff at The Rep. In addition to masterclasses with theatre professionals, the group will have an opportunity to present 'work in progress' to a live audience via monthly scratch performance nights, the first of which takes place on Thursday 28 February.



Roxana Silbert's vision for the future

"Birmingham Repertory Theatre has a unique place in British theatre history and we want to invite everyone to come and explore that rich heritage as we celebrate one hundred years since the theatre was founded by my visionary predecessor, Sir

Barry Jackson. 'We've scheduled a fantastic series of events to mark our centenary and give people a wonderful opportunity to get a hands-on behind-the-scenes insight into the making of theatre, the history of The Rep and the amazingly talented people who have worked here. And as the theatre's iconic home on Broad Street is being renovated and reopened this year, there's also a chance to explore the history of that building, as well as the Old Rep.



Rep Community and Education

The Rep can be rightfully proud of its connections to the community and its contribution to the education of young people both from within Birmingham and beyond. The company has nineteen youth theatres with three hundred-and-fifty members, conducts two hundred-and-fifty workshops with schools each year, and has developed one hundred-and-fifty young playwrights since 2003. As part of its celebration, The Rep is giving every child born at City and Heartland's Hospitals in Birmingham during the one hundredth anniversary week (11 - 17 February) free theatre experiences at the venue for the first ten years of their life.

This will be the second Rep's Children project - its first was launched in partnership with Birmingham Family Learning Service and the Health Trust in 2004. Those one hundred-and-forty children, all of whom are now eight years old, are still going to the Rep year after year. Where possible, the theatre tries to offer productions that are suitable for the Rep's Children's age group - so, for example, this year's Rep's Children cohort will experience their first trip to the theatre in October, to see a special sensory performance for babies. The company's overall aim for children and families is to make theatre a very familiar part of their life.

The Rep is entering not only its second hundred years but also an exciting new era, with a new Artistic Director in Roxana Silbert at the helm. As previously mentioned, the autumn/winter season which will follow the Rep's September reopening will be announced on 15 February at the gala performance of Philip Pullman's I Was A Rat! - but there's plenty more to enjoy in the months leading up to that highly anticipated relaunch...

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



Spring Awakening

Set in Germany in 1891, it focuses on the character of the hedonistic Melchior, a fifteen-year-old boy who's considered to be so lewd and despicable that he's chased out of town. But Melchior is both bright and sensitive, and is crushed by the death during an abortion of his fourteenyear-old love, Wendla - an abortion thrust upon her by her narrow-minded parents. Struggling to come to terms with his loss, and persecuted by both his own parents and the authorities, Melchior finds himself suddenly confronted by the ghosts of his past...



The Animals And Children **Took To The Streets**

Robinson Crusoe And The Caribbean Pirates

Birmingham Hippodrome

I wish I hadn't waited so long to check out Birmingham Hippodrome's 2012/13 panto offering, because it really is a cracker of a show, with Brian Conley and Lesley Joseph taking top billing. Qdos Entertainment have certainly produced a fantastic evening (or afternoon, for that matter) of family entertainment, with colourful sets, statues, pyrotechnics and even a flying car all featuring! Frequently referencing his not-so-long-ago misadventures in I'm A Celebrity... Get Me Out of Here!, Brian Conley is pure comedy gold in the role of Robinson Crusoe, bringing his unique brand of slapstick humour to his quest for the chest of gold, the heart of the girl he loves and his efforts to become King of Birming-HAM!

Andrew Ryan is hilarious as the dame, Mrs Crusoe; he's like an oversized drag version of Katie Price, complete with teenyweeny bikini and desperate to find a love interest.

Lesley Joseph's in fine form, too, as the spritely and shapely Enchantress of The Ocean, trying her best to matchmake pretty Polly with the bumbling Crusoe. This being panto, the plot inevitably takes a backseat to the madcap antics. There are some great visual gags to enjoy throughout the show, including a caged Crusoe imprisoned by a huge gorilla, a dame in a cupcake, a moving tree trunk, and a hilarious 'mini-Michael Jackon'-in-a-box. With the obligatory audience participation (not to mention the equally obligatory fart and wee jokes) also present and correct, this truly is a brilliant show that will have children laughing out loud and adults giggling with glee. *Anita Champaneri*

Messy Jessie

Blue Orange Theatre. Birmingham

As many parents will surely be aware, there's plenty of theatre aimed at young children. However, it's also true that there's very little theatre aimed at preschool audiences. The Blue Orange Theatre set out to redress this balance with their production of Messy Jessie, designed to delight youngsters aged between two and five years old.

The story's both a simple one and a familiar one: Jessie is a little girl who keeps on getting in a terrible mess, whether it's getting paint all over her hands or pasta all over her head. A new day of the week, a new mess to be made! The production was delightfully presented, using outsized props, musical instruments, storytelling and interaction. The cast of four were excellent in their roles, interacting beautifully with the young audience, involving them in the drama until the children became participants themselves, playing instruments, joining in the story, and moving around the theatre space to get involved in the various activities on offer. It was also educational in a gentle way, teaching children the days of the week, simple music and, of course, how to respond to theatre and storytelling - important skills in this modern age of television and computers. I took my three-year-old along. At first he was determined to be shy - standing by the exit and refusing to go any further - but as the show progressed, he got more and more drawn in. By the end, perhaps inevitably, I pretty much needed a crowbar to get him out of there!

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ning performance. As nights of pure entertainment go, this was fab-u-lous!

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

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
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Hitchcock 3D CERT12a (98 mins)

Starring Anthony Hopkins, Helen Mirren, Scarlett Johansson, Toni Collette, Danny Huston, Jessica Biel Directed by Sacha Gervasi (USA)

What do Hitler, Nixon and Picasso have in common? They've all been played by Anthony Hopkins. Now the former Welsh actor takes a stab at the Master of Suspense, and once again we have to take a huge leap of faith. Facially, Hopkins is just not fat enough to convince us that he's Hitchcock but he does have enormous fun mimicking the director's extraordinary speech patterns. The story of Hitchcock's attempt to get Psycho off the ground, the film is never less than entertaining and is sprinkled with some good laughs. Indeed, it's a fascinating chapter in Hollywood's iconography, and Dame Helen, as Hitchcock's long-suffering wife Alma, provides a strong human spine. There are also some peachy cameos, with the Londonborn James D'Arcy particularly effective as a nervy Anthony Perkins. Cineastes should relish. In 3D.



Flight CERT 15 (138 mins)

Starring Denzel Washington, Don Cheadle, Kelly Reilly, John Goodman, Bruce Greenwood, Melissa Leo Directed by Robert Zemeckis (USA)

Denzel Washington is Whip Whitaker, a brilliant commercial pilot with a breezy manner and charisma to spare. Then, when his skills are called on to save two hundred passengers from near certain death, he reveals a heroic aptitude for the job. But there's something else... A story of selfdenial, Flight is a slick, engrossing drama about a man addicted to lying to himself. There's an incongruous subplot tacked on about a heroin addict, but as the latter is played by Kelly Reilly it acts as a persuasive counterbalance to Whitaker's own story. As always, Denzel fills the screen with his larger-than-life personality, presenting a man whose demons we abhor rather than the man fuelling them. It's a tough act, but the film pulls it off, even when Robert Zemeckis's direction is at its most knowing.

Directed by Roger Michell (UK)

As England braces itself for war with Germany, Franklin D Roosevelt invites the king and queen to his rural retreat in New York state - the first time a royal couple has visited a US president. As the preparations begin apace, Roosevelt (Murray) strikes up a friendship with his fifth cousin, Daisy (Linney), from whose viewpoint the events are described. It's a slight tale, beautifully told and obviously riding on the coattails of the far more engrossing The King's Speech (also featuring George VI). Even so, there are many pleasures, some delightful performances and a fresh perspective of a man who certainly carved his mark on history. The film's

most affecting scenes are the private moments between Roosevelt and the king (West), although both Olivia Williams and Olivia Coleman are wonderful as, respectively, Eleanor Roosevelt and Queen Elizabeth (the Queen Mum).





Bullet To The Head CERT 15 (91 mins)

Starring Sylvester Stallone, Sung Kang, Jason Momoa, Christian Slater, Sarah Shahi, Adewale Akinnuoye-Agbaje
Directed by Walter Hill (USA)

Not to be confused with the 1990 John Woo film Bullet In The Head, this actioner is based on the French graphic novel Du Plomb Dans La Tete. Sylvester Stallone plays a hitman who teams up with a cop (Kang, from Fast Five) so as to exact revenge on a murderous lawyer, real estate developer and police department. So many bad guys. Filmed in New Orleans.

Warm Bodies CERT 12a (98 mins)

Starring Nicholas Hoult, Teresa Palmer, John Malkovich, Dave Franco, Rob Corddry, Cory Hardrict Directed by Jonathan Levine (USA)

It had to happen. With the continuing prevalence of Shakespeare and films featuring rather handsome vampires, werewolves, zombies, etc, now comes a film with Romeo cast as a zombie. It's based on the popular novel of the same name by the Seattle writer Isaac Marion. Expect a good deal of humour.



Zed Nelson: Love Me

An exhibition which straddles the Art Gallery and nearby Lighthouse Media Centre, Love Me brings together a body of work by photographer Zed Nelson which reflects on the cultural and commercial forces that drive the global obsession with

The images contained within the exhibition were taken over a five-year period by Nelson as he visited eighteen countries across five continents, taking photographs not only of cosmetic surgeons, beauty queens and bodybuilders, but also of everyday teenagers, housewives and businessmen.



John Flaxman

was a leading exponent of British Neoclassicism, and was renowned for his spare draughtmanship in illustrations of stories from ancient Greece. The exhibition is curated by art historian David Bindman.




The Big Fight: My Story

Brilliant La Bécasse

REVIEW

As we sat amongst the charming seventeenth century timbers, enjoying a pre-dinner drink, it was clear that something very special was in store for us at La Bécasse. 'Locally sourced' is a phrase that many restaurants are proud to boast these days, but when your main course is presented to you on a slate from the Head Chef's own house, you can see why Will Holland and his team have a wellearned reputation for serving up memorable dining experiences. You'd be hard pushed to find finer food and a warmer welcome. Our starters of duck liver and scallops were simply

exquisite, as were the lovely little bites between courses. My main course of juniper roasted venison was delicious, matched only by the superb wine chosen by the attentive sommelier. My wife enjoyed the beef sirloin, and was particularly impressed by the accompanying Shropshire blue cheese dauphinoise. For dessert, I swiftly tucked away the caramel souffle, accompanied by toasted marshmallow, popcorn and clotted cream ice cream, which tasted every bit as scrumptious as it sounds. Meanwhile, across the table, 'white chocolate cheesecake, hazelnut and oat base, mulled winepoached figs with honeycomb, and a yoghurt sorbet' was also being demolished, the silence between us bearing testimony to the quality of these heavenly desserts.

It's hard to do justice to the La Bécasse experience without taking over this entire page. Food of the highest calibre served by friendly and attentive staff. It doesn't get any better than that. *Matt Morris*

Restaurant REVIEWS

New Worcestershire restaurant exceeds expectations..

I must confess that I didn't have high hopes for The Wood Norton, the newly refurbished boutique hotel just outside Evesham in Worcestershire. Looking at the sample menu prior to our visit, I saw the ominous words 'basil foam' - to my mind evidence of an establishment trying that little bit too hard to impress. I'm pleased to report that I was wholly mistaken. The Wood Norton re-opened in autumn 2012 following a £4million spruce-up, the former manor house's gorgeous interiors offering plenty of evidence of a job well done. The grounds are clearly still a work-in-progress, with rather eerie abandoned outhouses standing as a reminder of the estate's former life as a BBC training centre. A dramatic front patio looks out onto the River Avon and to Bredon Hill beyond. Boasting newly planted garden beds and contemporary sculpture come June, when the gardens have settled in, this will be a perfectly tranquil spot. Wood Norton Hall started out in the 1870s as a hunting lodge, and the associated sense of nobility and grandeur remains. Once inside, we were shown through extensive wood-panelled corridors to the dining room, again exquisitely decorated with what appears to be the original Victorian features and a rather wonderful twentieth century parauet floor.

Down to business - could they rustle up a decent Sunday lunch? I began with a well-constructed Pressing of Gressingham duck, although the accompanying shallot and lime pickle needed a touch more sweetness to offset the fattiness

of the bird. My partner had the oak smoked salmon with a smartly-named potato tartare, a potato salad echoing the flavours of beef tartare with lemon and capers. Mains were a roast Herefordshire

beef sirloin, served medium with generously sized Yorkshire puddings and just-right sprouts. The winner, though, was the smoked haddock with poached egg and hollandaise sauce, a tricky dish that demands precision-timing and strong technical skills from the chef. Both egg and hollandaise were perfectly cooked, oozing richness onto the soft, naturally-smoked fish.

Desserts included a well-judged cheese selection accompanied by home-made crackers and breads, and an elegant crème brulee with perfectly set custard and a crisp caramel shell. This is solid, quality cooking, and with three courses plus coffees and shortbread costing £20, good value for money too.

More locally produced beers and ciders, and a more interesting wine list, would be appreciated. All in all, though. The Wood Norton is a welcome addition to the region's food scene and deserves to do well. Helen Stallard
