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

Private Peaceful heading for the Midlands

A new UK tour of the hit one-man show Private Peaceful is heading for the Midlands. Simon Reade's highly acclaimed stage adaptation of Michael Morpurgo's World War One novel tells the story of a young soldier awaiting a dawn firing squad. The production, which debuted in 2004 and has since played to sell-out audiences across the country, sees Paul Chequer and Andy Daniel sharing the role of Private Tommo Peaceful. Chequer appeared in the 2012 film version of the story, while Daniel's theatre credits include Journey's End, The Railway Children and The History Boys. This latest tour, marking the centenary of the beginning of World War One, shows at the Festival Theatre, Malvern, from 17 to 19 April, and at The REP, Birmingham, from 14 to 17 May.



ELO co-founder honoured in home city

Composer, music producer and Brummie rock legend Jeff Lynne is to join fellow musicians Ozzy Osbourne, Tony Iommi and Roy Wood on Birmingham's Walk Of Stars, located along the city's popular Broad Street. ELO co-founder Lynne, who's worked with some of the industry's biggest names, will be presented with a duplicate of the Birmingham-made commemorative star by comedian Jasper Carrott at a ceremony at the Library of Birmingham on 13 March. Commenting on the newly bestowed honour, Lynne said: "I'm thrilled to be included on the Birmingham Walk of Stars! It's great to have my work recognised in my home town!'





Drayton Manor gearing up for new attraction

One of the region's most popular visitor attractions is getting ready to launch a new family thrill ride. Drayton Manor Theme Park in Tamworth, Staffordshire, which already features some of the biggest, wettest and scariest rides in the UK - Shock-wave, G-Force, Maelstrom, Apocalypse and Splash Canyon - will welcome new stomach-churning aerial adventure Air Race in time for the summer school holidays. Accommodating twenty-four riders at any one time, Air Race will feature banks, loops, dives and weightlessness, and will allow visitors to experience accelerations of almost 4G. Little wonder, then, that Drayton Manor is promising the new ride will give thrill-seekers 'the time of their life'.

Businesses invited to raise their rackets for charity

A 'shuttlecock showdown' at Birmingham's National Indoor Arena (NIA) is inviting local businesses to showcase their racket skills for charity. The 21 February event sees teams of four battle it out on court, with the participating players being drawn from Birmingham's business community. All monies raised will go to Badminton England's chosen charity, The Anders Foundation, an organisation which encourages young people of all abilities to achieve their sporting goals. Flatpack announces headline events

A festival which started out ten years ago as a monthly night in a Digbeth pub has announced its 2014 headliners. The elevenday Flatpack Film Festival is described as holding a 'unique place in the UK's film scene'. Organisers are promising the 2014 event will offer 'an eve-popping line-up of new features, shorts and special guests, as well as providing an alternative route-map to Birmingham via walking tours, installations and pop-up screenings across the city.' This year's highlights include The World Made Itself - an immersive piece of myth-making from LA-based artist and performer Miwa Matryek - the UK premiere of The Great Flood, which provides a portrait of the devastation caused by the Mississippi floods of 1927, Birmingham On Sea - a tale of a landlocked city's love affair with water - and an immersive and horizontal screening of 1972 sci-fi movie Silent Burning. Secret location for Russian political drama

Birmingham Opera Company is using a 'secret venue' to present a brand new production of Musorgsky's The Khovansky Files: A National Enquiry ('Khovanshchina') in April. The powerful political drama, which centres on rebellion and revolution, will be performed as part of the city's Russia Year of Culture 2014 celebrations, the opening performance of which takes place at Birmingham's Town Hall this month.

The opera company's founder and artistic director, Graham Vick, is the man at the helm of the new translation by Max Hoehn. Graham was one of the first international directors to be invited behind the Iron Curtain, helming a version of Prokofiev's War And Peace at the Kirov in 1991. For this latest production, he will lead a cast of international soloists, the City of Birmingham Symphony Orchestra, the City of Birmingham Symphony Orchestra Children's Chorus and over two hundred volunteers from Birmingham. Featured soloists include Paul Nilon, Eric Greene, Stephanie Corley, Joseph Guyton, Claudia Huckle, Keel Watson, Jeff Lloyd Roberts and Robert Winslade Anderson. Ex-Sugababe out on the road in Ben Elton musical...

Jade Ewen's vocal talents first came to the nation's attention in 2009, when she achieved fifth place in the Eurovision Song Contest. The same year she confirmed herself as a bonafide pop artist by joining one of the UK's most successful girl bands, replacing Keisha Buchanan in The Sugababes. Years before her big break, and having trained at the Sylvia Young Theatre School, Jade made her West End debut in Disney's The Lion King, at the tender age of twelve. With musical theatre being her first love, she's delighted to be making a return to the stage to play Dee Dee in Ben Elton's Rod Stewart - The Musical. What's On caught up with her to find out more...

Tell us about your character in Tonight's The Night, Jade...

Dee Dee is a really aggressive, fiery character who's full of zest. There's a bit of a love interest going on, but Rocky, the character she's in love with, doesn't love her. So there's a bit in the show where she expresses how she feels and reveals a certain vulnerability. I don't want to give too much away, but by the end of the show things have certainly changed around for her.

Is playing a feisty character something that comes quite easily? Yes and no. I like to copy and mimic things that I've seen, and I take inspiration from a few characters that I've seen in film and on TV, but then there's always the worry that you might be playing it too big. In theatre, there's always that compromise of making it natural while at the same time making it big enough on stage to convince the audience.

Do you get a lot of artistic freedom to play around with the character?

Our director obviously has ideas, but she tries to encourage us to go with our instincts. We try and tune in and go with that, but, generally speaking, it's a balanced, fifty/fifty relationship.

And what iconic Rod Stewart songs do you get to sing?

What Am I Going To Do and First Cut Is The Deepest, which is the favourite. That comes at the moment when Dee Dee is at her most vulnerable.

Were you a fan of Rod's music prior to being involved in Tonight's The Night?

I had no idea how much Rod Stewart music I actually knew. Obviously, a lot of it was before my time, so it wasn't as if I consciously grew up listening to it, but being involved in this, I've realised that it's everywhere. It's in adverts, in the background of things, on the radio or whatever. I now realise I knew most of the words to these songs, I just didn't realise they were Rod's. What's really interesting is that everyone, it doesn't matter which generation you're from, kind of knows a Rod Stewart song. A real Rod favourite of mine - which I don't sing in the show - is This Old Heart Of Mine. It's a really lovely song.

Tonight's The Night has been described as 'sexy'. Can you expand on that?

Because it's meant to have a rock'n'roll/gig feel, I guess there's a natural bit of sex and grit that comes through. There are a few love interests, but I wouldn't say it's overly raunchy. It's not like you need a certificate to come and watch it.

Are there any similarities between this and We Will Rock You?

I guess the only similarity is that it's wellknown songs incorporated into a musical. As far as the storyline goes, it's definitely very different. Also, as a cast, I'd hope that we come at this completely differently. Some of the group haven't seen We Will Rock You, so have been able to come at this fresh and uninfluenced. I like to think that we bring our own identity and put our own mark on it.

Most people will know you as one third of the Sugababes, as well as for your Eurovision entry, but is it true that theatre's your first love?

Absolutely! I did theatre before anything else. I went to Sylvia's (Sylvia Young Theatre School) and I've always been as equally focused on acting and dancing as I have singing. Singing was the avenue that got me out there, but a big part of me, as a performer, has come from theatre.

So is theatre where you see your future? I think so. I don't want it to be just one or the other, because I love music, I love performing and I love being on stage. I want my future to involve both recording and, hopefully, performing on the West End stage. And one day on Broadway too - that would be amazing.

With the West End, is there a particular role that's up there on your list?

Elphaba would be amazing. Wicked is a great show. I love the songs, and everybody likes to fly...

What about an Andrew Lloyd Webber musical...

I would love to, definitely. I've never asked or hinted, because I think it might be a little bit awkward. We'll have to see - maybe I'll invite him along to the show...

Are you still in touch?

He's not the easiest person to keep in touch with because he doesn't have a mobile phone. You have to kind of physically bump into Andrew; you can't just call him on his mobile or send him a text.

You're touring with Tonight's The Night until April. What's in the diary after that?

There are a few things in the pipeline, but I have to await confirmation before I can tell. One of those will hopefully be theatre. Also, I'll carry on recording solo material for my debut album. I'm doing bits for that at the moment, but it's proving to be a little difficult juggling different hats - switching from writing to recording to theatre - and also finding time to sleep!

Are you quite disciplined in terms of how you allocate your time?

I'm finding this tour a really good experience for me, because it's the first time I've really had to organise myself and take care of my own accommodation and all that sort of stuff. All of that's normally dealt with by your management. At times it's been a bit overwhelming, but I'm finding now that I've got a system in place which I'll apply to every aspect of my life in future. It's definitely about finding a balance and, luckily for me, it's only in theatre. When I'm recording, it's just a case of turning up. The rest is for somebody else to juggle.

What's been the biggest learning-curve for you in going on tour with this show?

For some reason I'm always thrown in at the deep end. It happened with Eurovision, performing live in front of one hundred-andtwenty-two million people. That whole experience was very intense. Then it happened again joining the band. The Sugababes were obviously a massive band before I was in the group, and then it was dealing with press, learning eight albumsworth of songs and going out on tour again very intense. With Splash, I couldn't swim, so I literally had to dive in at the deep end. I think I have a habit in life of just getting stuck in and then worrying about the rest once I'm in. If I worried too much about things and guestioned my ability, I'd never do anything. Once I've agreed to do something, I often look back and think, "oh, what have I done?", by which time it's too late and I've just got to get on with it.

Ex Sugababe bandmate Heidi Range is also out on tour, with the stage version of Happy Days. Are you supportive of each other's post-band solo projects? Definitely! I'm glad that Heidi's experiencing it as well. I know she's a massive fan of theatre, but she's never had the opportunity to do it before. If you're a performer, all you

want is to be on stage, and you get to do that almost every night of the week when you're in a musical. If you're in a band, you get to do it, but it's more seasoned. You may be recording for however many months, then there may be a couple of months of live performances, and then it's back to the studio or promoting. I think, as an artist, the thing you crave most is to be up there performing on a stage.

Do you foresee The Sugababes ever getting back together in the future? There are no definite plans to get back together. That said, I can't say it's over, a

together. That said, I can't say it's over. At the moment we're all busy doing our own individual projects.

You've mentioned working on your debut album. How would you describe this? It's very soulful and sometimes quite emotional. Putting it together has been a sort of healing process, because there have been a lot of emotional things that I've gone through. I've discovered things about myself, and I've grown as a person. I guess I'd summarise it as a soulful and healing chapter of my life. This has been the first time I've been able to express myself without having all the pressure and restrictions which have gone before. It's been a reminder of why I came into the music business in the first place.

As a singer, who inspires you most?

I've got a few, but I really love Stevie Wonder. His storytelling is amazing, and the fact that he's blind, and my dad's blind, means it feels like there's a real connection.

Finally, what's your ultimate goal as a performer?

I definitely want to do more theatre, and I'd love to go over to America and see what's out there. They seem to love the Brits, and I'd certainly like to investigate new territories. I guess, basically, I'd like to achieve world domination...

Matthew Bourne

reflects on the moment he realised Swan Lake was a hit...

Director-choreographer Matthew Bourne first premiered his revelatory Swan Lake in 1995, since which time this modern reinterpretation of a ballet-world mainstay has transfixed audiences across the globe. With a new version of Swan Lake about to hit the road, Matthew reflects on a show which has not only become a genuine cultural phenomenon but also transformed the lives of many, not least that of Bourne himself.

When Swan Lake premiered at London's Sadler's Wells Theatre, did you have any idea it would go on to achieve such success?

Absolutely not; you couldn't predict anything like that. I just remember in the rehearsal room having to get the thing done. It was a long piece - the longest by far that I'd done up to that point - so it was about working away at just trying to do the best we could do. I wasn't really thinking beyond that.

Nonetheless, the venture must have prompted speculation in the dance world and beyond?

It did! There were all sorts of doubts expressed by people outside the room, and I was well aware that there were two prevailing camps. One group was sure that the piece was going to be hilarious and a real send-up; they were the ones who couldn't wait! There were others who kept saying, "You do know it's a tragedy and you're not going to mess around with it, are you?".

What did you think you had in the rehearsal room itself?

I remember all of us feeling that we liked the idea, and that we had something we thought could work, but I don't think we were overconfident. It was more about a sense of us working towards the same thing, and simply having a confidence in the fact that we liked the idea of what we were doing.

Can you recall the actual seedbed for the idea - the moment when the project itself actually took hold?

The very first idea was the thought of allmale swans. That had come to me watching the ballet long before I ever had a company or any possibility of doing Swan Lake at all; it was just a daydream. I remember being intrigued as to what that might do to the plot. It helped, of course, that I'd seen the ballet itself a lot. So I had this memory of Royal Ballet dancer Anthony Dowell as the Prince, wandering around in Act One pretty much saying, "No, I will not get married; take her away, I want something else!". So I just thought, "Oh, there's something going on in this story that's not being told".

What was that precisely?

I think it was that feeling of someone who's yearning for something, which seemed to me a metaphor for someone who's possibly gay; or who maybe just wanted a different kind of woman, or something like that. It definitely felt to me like something that was there in the ballet itself and not like anything I'd invented. And if you consider Tchaikovsky's own life, and the turmoil and violence in the music, that also suggested something much deeper than a lot of pretty swans in a row.

Do you remember a 'click' moment in performance when you sensed a hit on your hands?

Very much so. The bit, I think, that made the audience go completely quiet was the

entrance of Adam Cooper as the Swan. All of a sudden, you felt people thinking, "This isn't what we were expecting!". It suddenly went very quiet, very serious. And then I remember Cameron Mackintosh, the producer, coming up in the interval and saying that he had to do this in the West End, and I thought, "this is only the interval, but - well, Cameron does know; there's something about his instinct!". It was once the second half got going and we were into the Ball scene that it all became suddenly electric. Then, when Adam came on in his leather trousers as the Black Swan, the show really caught fire. At the end there was this spontaneous roar - which the piece has received ever since - and that was honestly something I hadn't expected at all.

It must be infuriating when you hear the work described as 'the all-male Swan Lake', since there are women prominently featured in the cast, albeit not as the swans.

Very much so, and we've had some wonderful women over time, from Fiona Chadwick and Etta Murfitt onwards. That misperception you mention is so easy to say, and it makes sense to everyone - but I do have to correct it, obviously. For one thing, I don't want people sitting there during the scenes with the royals thinking that they're watching men in drag!

I'm glad you reference the royals, who have to be mentioned, given that they were in a very different place in 1995 from where they are now. For one thing, Princess Diana was alive at the time.

Yes, and she saw it, we believe. It's funny; the royal aspect is the thing I thought everyone would pick up on, because royal scandal was such a big deal when we opened Swan Lake. All that, I have to say, was quite inspiring in a way. One felt there was a story going on in real life, as in Swan Lake, in which a prince couldn't marry the person he really loved - in Charles' case, Camilla - and so had to marry a suitable young person instead, namely Diana. All that seemed terribly sad if you looked at it from a purely human point of view, so I thought there was a lot of sympathy to be had for a prince who couldn't be what he wanted to be.

Yes, it's important that the royal aspect of your production isn't viewed merely as facetious, or as a romp.

I do think the royal family really liked it, and found it very sympathetic; but no one is going to admit to that or say it publicly. I found out from Princess Margaret, when she came to see Cinderella, that she had the video and, as I say, we're pretty sure that Diana had been in. What's intriguing, too, is that we were asked to do it as part of the Royal Variety performance, apparently as a personal request from the Queen - so they certainly didn't turn against it because of the subject matter.

How do you think the intervening years have refocused that aspect of the production?

Well, we have different sorts of royals now. The young princes seem more well-adjusted - or shall we say 'normal' - so I'm not sure we see them in quite the same way as we once looked at Charles. On the other hand, I do think there's still very much a relevance here. There's a lot of protection and grooming that still goes on; I mean, Kate didn't just emerge as a fully formed royal. You still have to be a certain type of person to be part of the royal family, and it's important that our story is set in an uncertain, unspecified time period. It's as much about now as it was about then.

You went on from Swan Lake to devise numerous pieces, from Edward Scissorhands to Play Without Words, and from Cinderella to Sleeping Beauty. Does Swan Lake occupy a privileged position, simply because of what it represented for you?

I like to think of all those pieces you mention as children; and, as with any child, you can't pick a favourite. But of course I'm hugely grateful to Swan Lake - how could I not be? It changed my life and a lot of people's lives. It took us to Broadway and made us an international company. The fact is, I still love thinking about it and working on it, and I still have a lot to say about it to the dancers. It's amazing to think that in eighteen years we've gone from a company of eight to one of seventy, and that we've done more performances of our Swan Lake during those years than the Royal Ballet has done during its entire existence.

What you're doing, presumably, with your company New Adventures is looking forward as well as back...

That's exactly right. Swan Lake was the trailblazer - so much so that when we cast the show nowadays we find men whose whole ambition as dancers has been about appearing in this piece. By contrast, eighteen years ago it was hard to get a cast of fourteen swans together! Now, hundreds come to each audition. But what's most satisfying is that this hasn't been our only successful thing. I wouldn't feel the same about Swan Lake if it had been a one-hit wonder. I'm grateful for this show, but also for all the ones that have come since, not least in terms of the public following myself and following the company.

Alan Ayckbourn

talks about his latest play, Arrivals And Departures...







With seventy-eight plays under his belt, more than forty of which have been performed in the West End, Alan Ayckbourn is one of the world's most prolific and successful playwrights. The Tony and Olivier Award-winner's latest work - Arrivals And Departures - is this month being performed at Warwick Arts Centre alongside two of his other plays, Time Of My Life and Farcicals. What's On recently caught up with Alan to talk about his career, his inspirations, and the very particular challenges of writing for the stage...

What can you tell us about your new play, Arrivals And Departures, Alan?

It's a memory play, in short. It's got a cast of thirty speaking parts shared between eleven actors plus two children. But while it's a big play in scale, it's not a big play in terms of the characters. It centres around a single, central relationship and is essentially all about two people, Barry and Ez. Against this background, there's also a side-plot running which is to do with an ambush to catch a terrorist. So it's a play on several levels. Hopefully it will not confuse but amuse!

You describe it as a memory play. What does that mean?

Two strangers meet and the audience learn about their back-stories through their memories. So at the end of the play, the characters themselves know precious little more about each other than they did when they started out. It was interesting for me to write. Normally, as the characters get to know each other, so do the audience. But here, only the audience gets to know the back-stories, and only they realise how close these characters could be, but for the fact that they're strangers.

Was there anything which particularly inspired you to write the play?

Not really. It sort of evolved from this idea of telling a story through memories. Form always fascinates me. Arrivals And Departures has an interesting structure. Having written so many plays, many of which have straight narratives, I think that nowadays one of the interests for me is to surprise and intrigue the audience through the way the story is told, just as much as through the story itself. There aren't that many new stories to tell, if indeed any; it's only in the way they're narrated that the story becomes new. I think my audience has got used now to saying, "how's this going to start?". It's also not just a matter of looking for new ways to tell a story, but of keeping me fresh as well.

How do you write a story told primarily through memories?

Cinema has always been a prime influence on me, much more so than stage work. The grammar of cinema is something immediately adaptable to the sort of theatre I work in, which is normally free of big set changes. I'm free to use cinematic techniques, such as the flashbacks in Arrivals And Departures. There's a whole series of memories for Ez and Barry which, in their minds, probably seem far longer than they actually are. How often do we get a flash of memory and you've apparently been back in time for about twenty minutes but only a second has passed in real time? You can't have twenty-minute scenes on stage and then say to the audience, only a second has passed in real time. So you have to try and condense the information in these memory scenes. It's an exercise in

'precise information' playwriting; writing a scene of less than a page which gives you four or five pages of information. This is also challenging because brevity is no guarantee of interest - brevity, mercifully, just doesn't take very long!

The play also has an unusual setting...

One of the most notable things about Arrivals And Departures is that there isn't a single domestic scene in the play. They're all set on railway stations or in bus stations - all to do with transportation. Even the flashbacks always happen in airports, multistorey car parks and so on; anywhere except a domestic sitting room. This is, I think, not unrelated to the title of the play, which also refers to other arrivals and departures in life, such as births and deaths.

What can you tell us about the main characters - Ez and Barry?

Ez is a young female soldier who's lost her faith in human nature. Barry is a traffic warden from Harrogate. He's a fascinating character and not a million miles away from Douglas Beechey in my play Man Of The Moment, who's also had a troubled subtext of a life. Everything has fallen in on Barry, but he's the sort of person who keeps the smile in place because his philosophy is, if you smile every day, you spread a little bit of happiness and you make the world a slightly happier place. But the consequence of that is you don't let anyone in. So there's a fortress about him, and the smile excludes anyone taking him at more than skin-deep level. We get the privilege of moving in quite close and seeing beneath the smile.

Arrivals And Departures is playing in repertory with Time Of My Life. Are there any similarities between the plays? Both plays are to do with time, which is interesting. But the way time is used in

interesting. But the way time is used in Arrivals And Departures is nowhere near as complicated as how time is used in Time Of My Life. I'm still looking at the old prompt script of Time Of My Life to see how we originally did it!

Did you have a desire to tell stories from an early age?

Yes. Storytelling was a big part of my upbringing - probably the result, during my early years, of having a mother as a writer who spent most of her time writing in order to feed our single-parent family of two! What choice did I have?

Strong-minded women feature heavily in your work. Why's this?

The result of the above. My mother had gone right off men at that particular time and preferred the company of other women. They chatted away for hours and usually never noticed little six-year-old me, playing in the corner. But I heard them.

Did starting out as an actor influence your writing?

It's not uncommon for playwrights to start out as actors. From Shakespeare onwards, it's been very important; a sort of apprenticeship, really. There's nothing like actually doing it for learning the craft. It's a bit like learning an instrument before embarking on composition.

Who's inspired you most as a writer, and why?

I was 'born' as a writer at an interesting time for British theatre. At the end of the old order - from Coward, Rattigan etc backwards - and on the threshold of the new order - Pinter, Osborne and company onwards. So at the start, practically everyone influenced me. Plus a whole load of black-and-white - as well as silent - films.

What do you consider the essential components of a great play?

Good narrative, absorbing and shifting characters, and preferably an intriguing angle. A great play is one that keeps you in your seat, filled with expectation and anticipation till the very end.

Do you always follow the same format when writing?

Never. I try always to start with a clean sheet. Obviously, ingrained technique and technical know-how will govern me to some extent, but whenever possible, at my stage of life, I like to break all the rules.

Have you ever given up on a play?

Yes, once every few years. Hopefully before they're even produced!

Who's been the most difficult character to develop?

The good people are the hardest to make interesting. Villains are easy and generally more fun!

Tom Odell

Civic Hall, Wolverhampton, Sun 9 February

Shooting to fame with album The Long Way Down and standout single Another Love, Tom Odell won the BRIT Awards Critics' Choice gong in 2013. Nominated for two BRITs this year, for Best British Male Solo Artist and British Breakthrough Act, Tom shows no sign of slowing down, and will stop off at five UK venues on this tour. Recently revealing his fear of spiders when one crawled across his piano onstage in Tasmania, he's forecast that fellow artist Sam Smith will have 'a huge year' in 2014 - as long as he watches out for spiders!

Mr Scruff

The Assembly, Leamington Spa, Thurs 13 February; Hare & Hounds, Birmingham, Fri 14 - Sat 15 March

This DJ, producer, cartoonist and self-professed tea drinker is named after his scruffy beard and love of loose line drawings. Renowned for all-nightlong, across-the-board DJ sets, Mr Scruff presents a vinyl melting-pot of jazz, soul, hip-hop, funk, disco, deep house, reggae, dubstep, afrobeat, latin and gems that defy categorisation. A talented illustrator - he draws the covers to his albums and singles - he's best known for tracks such as Get A Move On. His Midlands gigs are among a handful of shows he's presenting across the UK and Europe this month.





Beyoncé

LG Arena, Birmingham, Sun 23 - Mon 24 February

Famed for her high-energy performances and spectacular stage shows, Beyoncé Knowles' star continues to be in the ascendant. The former Destiny's Child singer is now one of the best-selling music artists of all time, having notched up in excess of seventyfive million album sales worldwide. Not surprisingly given that fact, she's also bagged her fair share (and then some!) of gongs and accolades, including way more Grammy Awards than she's got fingers and no small number of MTV Video Music Awards. She visits Birmingham this month with her Mrs Carter Show, which was the highest grossing tour by a female artist in 2013.

Debut album If You Wait not only earned London Grammar Number Two spots in both the UK and Australian album charts, it also bagged them a BRIT Award nomination in the British Breakthrough Act category. The Gipsy Kings

Civic Hall, Wolverhampton, Fri 21 February

Presenting music that's been described as having 'a rumba flamenca style with pop influences', The Gypsy Kings hail from Arles and Montpellier in the South of France and perform in Spanish with an Andalusian accent. Formed in 1978, they enjoyed a major success with their self-titled debut album, and have since become even more widely known as a result of their contributions to the soundtracks of hit movies The Big Lebowski and Toy Story 3.



Penguin Café

Warwick Arts Centre, Coventry, Wed 19 February

Continuing the legacy of the Penguin Café Orchestra, created by Simon Jeffes forty years ago, Penguin Café was formed in 2010 by Simon's son, Arthur, when he realised how much he missed his father's music. Describing their sound as 'cheerfully beautiful chaos', Arthur mixes original Penguin Cafe Orchestra music with new compositions, fusing traditional Englishness with rhythms from other cultures, such as those of South America and West Africa. Following last year's sellout UK tour, Penguin Cafe are this month releasing new album The Red Book.



Skaters

Hare & Hounds, Birmingham, Fri 28 February This transatlantic trio comprises LA-based singer Michael Cummings and drummer Noah Rubin, both of The Dead Trees, and London-based guitarist Joshua Hubbard from Dirty Pretty Things. Meeting in the middle, they now call Manhattan their home. A constant source of inspiration, they're gearing up for the release of aptly titled debut Manhattan, just prior to this King's Heath show. Influenced by skate culture and the ethos of acceptance, the band's Birmingham stop-off is one of eight UK shows.



Bonobo

The Institute, Birmingham, Thurs 27 February

It looks like being another busy year for musician, producer and DJ Simon Green, stage name Bonobo. He's already confirmed slots at two of the world's most prestigious music festivals - Coachella and Sonar - and is also undertaking a twenty-date tour of Europe and the UK. All this after releasing his album The North Borders late last year. Still, with over ten years' experience, countless mix records and five successful albums - including Dial M For Monkey and Black Sands - under his belt, he's a man who's well used to busy schedules. He's accompanied at The Institute by a full live band.

Gerry Cross The Mersey

Artrix, Bromsgrove, Sat 15 February

Best known for the hit song Ferry Cross The Mersey - and for the version of You'll Never Walk Alone that first inspired Liverpool FC's supporters to sing the most famous of all football anthems - Gerry Marsden is one of the UK music industry's greatest 1960s icons. This hugely popular show offers his fans the chance to take a nostalgia-drenched stroll down memory lane, as Gerry presents an evening that sees him blending his greatest hits with plenty of stories, jokes and anecdotes from his fifty-plus years in the business.

The Beards

The Glee Club, Birmingham, Mon 17 February

Singing songs that extol the virtues of having a beard, these four hairy Australians - Johann Beardraven, John Beardman Jr, Nathaniel Beard and Facey McStubblington - are the perfect antidote to the winter blues. Embarking on their first ever world tour, they've specifically picked First World countries to visit, as "people living in developed countries are more susceptible to shaving - it's important for our message to reach them". Hits include If Your Dad Doesn't Have A Beard You've Got Two Dads.



Suzanne Vega

Town Hall, Birmingham, Mon 3 February

A sensitive, deeply personal artist, whose success presaged a wave of singer/songwriters, Suzanne Vega first reached international attention with the massive single Marlene On The Wall. Each of her following albums has seen her making plenty of musical developments, even if the themes have remained pretty much constant. Although unlikely to regain the levels of success she enjoyed in the late-1980s, mainly because there's so much competition these days, she remains a thoughtful and rewarding performer. Her 2014 world tour is in celebration of her new album Tales From The Realm Of The Queen Of Pentacles.



Fairport Convention

Theatre Severn, Shrewsbury, Thur 6 Feb; Royal Spa Centre, Warwickshire, Tues 11 Feb; Town Hall, Birmingham, Tues 4 Mar;

Given that seminal album Liege & Lief is hailed as having been the inspiration for the electric folk movement, it's hardly surprising that Fairport Convention are considered to be one of English folk rock's most important groups. Founded in 1967, the band have, at various times, featured some of the country's most talented musicians, and since 1979 have hosted the Cropredy Festival, the largest annual event of its kind in England.

Ingrid Fliter: Chopin Birthday Concert

Birmingham Town Hall, Sat 22 February

One of only a handful of pianists to have received the Gilmore Artist Award, Ingrid Fliter is renowned for her collaborations with some of the world's most celebrated orchestras. The Argentinian-born musician is held in the highest regard for the 'eloquence and truth' that her performances bring to the music of Chopin, with Gramophone magazine describing her recording of the Polish composer's waltzes as 'amongst the finest Chopin recordings in recent years'. This Birmingham concert is one of three UK dates for Filter, and sees her performing a programme that comprises Chopin's Nocturne in D flat, Op 27, No 2; Scherzo No 4 in E; Mazurka in C sharp minor, Op 50, No 3; Waltz in A minor (Op posth), Ballade in F minor, Op 52, No 4 and Twenty-four Preludes.

Ehnes Quartet

The Barber Institute, Birmingham, Wed 5 February

Here appearing at the Barber for the first time, the Ehnes Quartet comprises four internationally renowned string musicians, and is regarded as 'one of the most sought-after chamber groups performing today'. Led by the muchcelebrated Canadian violinist James Ehnes, the quartet also features Amy Schwartz Moretti on violin, Richard O'Neill on viola and Robert deMaine on cello. Highlighting the musicians' versatility and virtuosity, this Birmingham concert sees the quartet present two works with traditional, folk-influences - Bartok's String Quartet No.3, SZ85 and Suk's Meditation On The Old Czech Hymn St Wenceslas, Op.35a. These are performed alongside Beethoven's Quartet Op.74 in E flat, 'Harp', and Ravel's String Quartet in F, the latter of which has become the quartet's signature piece.



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Ensemble 360

Bridge House Theatre, Warwick, Sun 16 February

With a fast-growing reputation for its ability to engage with different audiences and age groups, Ensemble 360 comprises eleven musicians of international standing who share the belief that concerts should be informal, friendly, relaxed and, where possible, performed 'in the round'. Celebrating Britain's industrial heritage and the centenary of Benjamin Britten, this Warwick concert sees the ensemble perform Britten's Six Metamorphoses After Ovid Op.49 for solo oboe (film by artist Katie Goodwin), Piper's With Stolen Fire with archive film footage from the BFI -Britten's Sinfonietta, Martinu's Nonet and Wagner's Siegfried Idyll.

This evening performance follows Ensemble 360's family concert Stan And Mabel, staged at Bridge House Theatre earlier on the same day.

Handel's Theodora

Birmingham Town Hall, Thurs 6 February Widely regarded as a neglected masterpiece, Handel's Theodora is said to have been the German composer's favourite oratorio, rating higher than his more popular Messiah. This version of the Roman tragedy is brought to Birmingham by the English Consort under the guidance of Artistic Director Harry Bicket. Sung in English with English surtitles, the production also features Rosemary Joshua (Theodora), Sarah Connolly (Irene), Tim Mead (Didymus), Andrew Kennedy (Septimus) and Neal Davies (Valens). The Choir of Trinity Church Wall Street, New York, supports.

Formed by Trevor Pinnock in 1973, the English Consort boasts a fine reputation for its inspiring performances of Baroque and Classical music. The 2013/14 season sees the Consort marking its fortieth anniversary with an extensive tour, performing Theodora at top concert halls both here and in the United States, including London's Barbican and New York's Carnegie Hall.



The Midland Sinfonia: A Fine Romance

Artrix, Bromsgrove, Sat 8 February Founded by Nigel Morley in 1995, Worcestershire-based orchestra the Midland Sinfonia is no stranger to Artrix in Bromsgrove, where, under the directorship of conductor Richard Laing, it regularly delights audiences with its extensive repertoire. Promising an early 'Valentine's treat', A Fine Romance sees the orchestra joined by Shulah Oliver on violin and Diana Mathews on viola in a programme of works from the late-eighteenth century romantic period. Beethoven's Romance in F, Mozart's Sinfonia Concertante and Mozart's Symphony No 40 all feature.




Tonight's The Night: The Rod Stewart Musical

The title of the work refers to a lowly soldier named Franz Woyzeck, who is stationed in a provincial German town and living with Marie, the mother of his child, who was born out of wedlock and therefore not blessed by the church. To make extra money, Franz agrees to take part in medical experiments, but soon finds his mental health severely compromised as he begins to experience a series of apocalyptic visions...This particular version of the play, presented to coincide with the centenary of World War One, is influenced by the styles of playwrights Steven Berkoff and Antoine Artaud, and comes with a free education pack.



Twelfth Night

As with many Shakespearean comedies, Twelfth Night is based on a case of mistaken identity, with Viola disguising herself as a boy and causing all sorts of awkward romantic shenanigans. 

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



Strictly Come Dancing Live

National Indoor Arena, Birmingham

Strictly fans got to escape the January blues for an evening when the show arrived in Birmingham for the start of its national tour. The three male judges returned to the city and seemed to be loving every minute of it - although they'd toned down their camp and saucy banter by comparison with last year. The 2014 tour was hosted by 2012 competitor Lisa Riley, and featured all three finalists from the last series - Natalie Gumede, Susanna Reid and winner Abbey Clancy.

Highlights from the first half included a gorgeous American Smooth from rugby player Ben Foden and Russian 'pocket rocket' Kristina Rihanoff, a dramatic Paso Doble from Susanna Reid and Kevin Clifton, and an awesome jive from favourites Natalie Gumede and Artem Chingvitsev. Westlife's Nicky Byrne and partner Karen impressed with a slick, sharp and supercool James Bond-inspired Argentine Tango, while series winners Abbey Clancey and Aljaz Skorjanec performed a truly beautiful quick-step.

Ben and Kristina fired up the second half with a sexy salsa, after which things got even better, courtesy of Natalie and Artem's sublime Viennese Waltz, while Mark Benton and Iveta's cha cha cha spoofed MC Hammer.

The fabulous finale was a hot disco salsa by the gorgeous Abbey and Aljaz, the latter of whom raised the roof in his Travolta-style white suit. The pair topped the leaderboard again, with a fabulous thirty-out-of-thirty score, but it was Natalie and Artem who won the audience vote and were duly crowned the evening's winners.

Thriller Live

ICC, Birmingham

Thriller Live, the all-singing, all-dancing theatrical homage to Michael Jackson, recently moonwalked into the ICC.

The show opened X Factor-style, with a booming voice listing the King of Pop's mega-selling singles and albums and hailing his influence on today's crop of pop performers. It was all lights and action in the first half, as the show disco-stomped through the hits of the Jackson 5 and Jacko's first solo album, Off The Wall, in the process treating us to the likes of Blame It On The Boogie, Can You Feel It and Don't Stop Til You Get Enough. Four singers, all trying their best to sound like Jackson, shared lead vocals. These included Birmingham-born Cleopatra (Comin Atcha) Higgins and white, longhaired rocker Jesse Smith, whose rendition of Dirty Diana made it seem like we were reliving the X Factor Live finals. While some of the vocals and moves were slightly off, the second half of the show went bad-ass on the crowd, featuring all the big dancefloor numbers from the greatest album of the twentieth century, Thriller. The frisson of excitement was palpable when the dancers cracked some deft moves to Smooth Criminal.

All the classic dance moves were on show, from the moonwalk and crotch-grabs to the trilby doffs and gravity-defying leans. The Jacko favourites were saved for the final act - Beat It, the visually stunning Thriller and the high-octane anthem BAD. The crowd's reaction was fantastic. Wendy And Peter Pan

Royal Shakespeare Theatre, Stratford-upon-Avon

There are some stories that never grow old, stories whose stature seems to grow with each new flight of the imagination. In this latest re-imagining of JM Barrie's timeless tale of daring heroics, everlasting childhood, dastardly pirates and lost children, Ella Hickson takes her characters on a transformative journey beyond the sheltered land-scapes of the Edwardian nursery - a familiar world of pre-received wisdom bathed in the soft glow of tradition - catapulting them headlong into a Neverland of their own imagining, where shadows lurk around every corner, battles are fought and won, happy thoughts are rediscovered, and heroines (as well as heroes) are made! This latest festive offering from the RSC sees an uncharacteristically feisty Wendy take centre-stage in a story that places 'loss' at the heart of her imaginative recovery and, by association, her self-discovery.

Faced with the crippling loss of her younger brother Tom, and convinced that his shadow still haunts her window, Wendy's heroic quest to salvage what remains of her parents' marriage begins when the mercurial figure of Peter Pan arrives in her nursery one night. He's accompanied by an army of shadows simulating flight, their combined presence 'lifting' Peter to the status of God in his own make-believe reality. Wendy And Peter is, at its heart, a classic swashbuckling family adventure, complete with stunning aerial acrobatic sequences, ferocious fight-scenes, dastardly pirates ships and fantastical sets, all of which lend the piece a wonderfully quirky and, at times, genuinely mesmerising charm. *Katherine Ewing*



The work - which brings together fourteen talented dancers with an eclectic soundtrack featuring original music by Shechter - has certainly garnered its fair share of plaudits.

'The world is perfect,' informs its publicity. 'From the darkness of Shechter's emotive and often angry world emerges a bright white light dancing out of the smoke and chaos'.

Sun hasn't been to everybody's liking, mind, with some critics feeling that the material is rather thin and repetitive. Buy a ticket and judge for yourself.



George Clooney surrounds himself with another all-star cast for what looks like a fascinating slice of Second World War history. Based on the book by Robert M Edsel, this is the true story of a group of art historians and curators who are conscripted to infiltrate Nazi Germany in order to track down invaluable works of art. It transpires that Hitler looted Europe and Russia on an epic scale, seizing an enormous quantity of priceless paintings, sculpture, furniture and artefacts to store in his hometown of Linz in Austria. And we're talking works by Leonardo Da Vinci, Michelangelo, Raphael, Rembrandt and Vermeer, many of which are still missing. Clooney himself wrote the screenplay along with his long-time collaborator Grant Heslov.


Tinkerbell And The Pirate Fairy


Directed by Jim Jarmusch (UK/Germany)



The film, based on Mark Helprin's novel Winter's Tale, marks the directorial debut of the acclaimed scriptwriter Akiva Goldsman (A Beautiful Mind, Cinderella Man, The Da Vinci Code, I Am Legend, etc).



Stalingrad CERT 15 (131mins) Starring Petr Fedorov, Yanina Studilina, Dmitriy Lysenkov, Thomas Kretschmann Directed by Fedor Bondarchuk (Russia)

The Soviet filmmaker Sergei Bondarchuk (1920-1994) made arguably the biggest film ever to come out of Russia, namely Waterloo (1970). Now his son Fedor has taken on the battle of Stalingrad, the decisive WWII conflict between the Germans and the Russians. Not only is the film in 3D, but it's the first non-American movie to be produced in the IMAX format. Incidentally, Herr Kretschmann is best known for starring in the 1993 German film Stalingrad [sic].

Charlotte Gainsbourg is one of the few actresses willing to work with Lars von Trier on a repeat basis. And, boy, does he put her through the wringer. In Nymphomaniac, released in two parts - or 'volumes', she plays the eponymous woman who relays the details of her erotic life to a complete stranger (Skarsgård). Expect scenes of hardcore sex.

Labor Day CERT 12a (111mins)

Starring Kate Winslet, Josh Brolin, Tobey Maguire, Gattlin Griffith, Clark Gregg, Brooke Smith Directed by Jason Reitman (USA)

The films of Jason Reitman (Juno, Up In The Air, Young Adult) tend to be about the journeys taken by a single character - usually with a good deal of humour. Labor Day, adapted from the novel by Joyce Maynard, is different in that it's about a family. One might even accuse it of Norman Rockwell-esque aspirations of Americana, but then this is no ordinary family. Kate Winslet's Adele Wheeler is suffering from a degenerative psychological disorder, her thirteen-year-old son Hank (Griffith) is taking on the responsibilities of the house, and Mr Wheeler has run off with another woman. Then a killer forces his way into their home! Reitman appreciates the power of detail and he draws the viewer into his sun-dappled, off-kilter scenario with cinematic finesse. The humour is there, but it's the humour that arises out of life, not a fabricated line of dialogue. The production values are ace and the central performances of Winslet and Josh Brolin are pitch perfect: Winslet at once confused, fragile and protective of her son; Brolin strong, warm and vigilant. If the film never entirely sheds its novelistic genesis, it is nonetheless an engrossing, gripping and moving tale.



The Book Thief CERT 12a (131mins) Starring Geoffrey Rush, Emily Watson, Sophie Nélisse, Ben Schnetzer, the voice of Roger Allam Directed by Brian Percival (USA)

Like The Boy in the Striped Pyjamas, Markus Zusak's 2005 novel The Book Thief is aimed at a 'young adult' readership. And as with John Boyne's book, the treatment of German children in the Second World War presents a problem in terms of a cinematic adaptation. Young adults should be aware of the atrocities, but they're not guite ready for Saving Private Ryan. Brian Percival's adaptation (he previously directed episodes of Downton Abbey) is a proficient if hardly riveting piece of cinema. As Liesel, the illiterate girl who develops a love of books under the tutorship of her foster parents, the extraordinarily pretty Sophie Nélisse looks better suited to selling cosmetics than anti-Nazi propaganda. And for a film about storytelling, the film is surprisingly weak on narrative traction.





Jamal Penjweny: Saddam Is Here

Ikon Gallery, Birmingham, Wed 19 February - Mon 21 April

Comprising twelve images of Iraqi people holding a lifesize picture of Saddam Hussain in front of their own, Jamal Penjweny's Saddam Is Here reinforces the belief that the late dictator's 'shadow is still following Iraqi society everywhere'. This latest work from Penjweny, who started his artistic career as a sculptor and painter before moving into photography, became the subject of international attention when it was included in Welcome To Iraq, in the Iraqi pavilion at the 2013 Venice Biennale, curated by Ikon Director Jonathan Watkins. This Birmingham presentation is Penjweny's first solo exhibition.



Walls With Wounds

Herbert Art Gallery & Museum, Coventry, Sat 15 February - Sun 18 May

Documenting Dale N Marshall's journey from rebellion to rehabilitation, Walls With Wounds consists of vibrant abstract and layered multimedia works which reference the artist's life.

The first reference is his time spent sectioned in Cornwall's St Lawrence's Hospital, one of Britain's oldest asylums. The second is his experience as a graffiti artist, when he demonstrated his artistic ability for the first ever time by spray-painting the walls of Bristol.

As well as these two experiences, Marshall also draws inspiration from his studio - a former Victorian workhouse in North Wales, the inscribed and decaying walls of which bear testament to the children who inhabited the building over one hundred years ago.

Described as both 'raw' and 'emotive', Marshall's works have been praised for the way in which they demonstrate that 'hope and redemption are possible, whatever darkness may lie beneath our scars'.

Charting the story of class mobility and examining the influence of social class on aesthetic taste, the exhibition comprises many of the characters, incidents and objects that Perry encountered while making his BAFTA award-winning documentary series. Using these characters to weave a narrative, the artist has produced a social commentary which focuses on the minutiae of contemporary taste, in so doing paying due homage to Hogarth's collection of eighteenth century paintings.



Indian powerhouse in the city...

Rajdoot is a long-established Indian restaurant which is well known on the Birmingham curry circuit. With a number of new kids on the block, I found myself wondering whether this Jewellery Quarter stalwart still had the power to tantalise and amaze its patrons' tastebuds?

On arrival, Rajdoot is a warm and inviting oasis. From the lighting to the soft furnishings, the Rajasthani-influenced decor helps set the stage for an evening of Indian dining.

I was accompanied on my visit by a vegetarian, who relished the wide variety of dishes on the menu. After taking our seats, we enjoyed poppadoms and a selection of accompaniments, including a tangy onion relish and a yogurtbased dip.

Our choice of Chicken Hariyali and Paneer Tikka (Indian cottage cheese) for starters was a good one. With a nice, spicy paste smothered onto the large pieces of paneer, this and the chicken starter were wolfed down in no time.

For mains, I opted for one of the 'Chef's Specialities' - Monkfish Tawa Masala and Lamb Gosht; a typical Indian dish of spicy lamb. My friend chose Paneer Makhani and Bhindi Mushroom (Okra). A coriander naan, a garlic naan and pilau rice accompanied our medley of spice dishes. Having never tried monkfish at an Indian restaurant before, I was impressed by how well this meaty fish absorbed the masala. The paneer was delicious too - perfectly balanced in flavour. As lovers of chilli, both my friend and I felt the Bhindi needed more of a kick, yet the chef had cooked it to crunch perfection. Our only disappointment was the coriander naan, which came out cold and slightly overcooked around the edges. We were, however, given

another one by the lovely waiter.

Following a curry with a heavy dessert is always dangerous, but I couldn't resist the gulab jaman, which hit my sugar spot perfectly. My friend enjoyed the kulfi. Rajdoot certainly offers a real Indian experience from the moment you enter the door. The attentive staff, plush interiors and well thought-out menu offer plenty of reason to visit this restaurant. Even as new dining establishments crop up in and around the city, this Indian powerhouse is showing that it still knows how to pack a significant punch or two. Parv Gandham

Taste of America coasts into Brum

Coast-to-Coast is the new American-themed restaurant & bar on Birmingham's Broad Street, part of a nationwide chain owned by the company which also owns Frankie & Benny's and Garfunkel's.

The place is huge - 'three hundred-and-sixty covers' huge with twenty chefs on the books. Fresh from a multi-million pound fit-out, the interiors are great fun; they've captured that 'American bar' feeling brilliantly. The food is what you'd expect - pizza, pasta, grills, Tex-mex; a lot of meat and carbs, not too many vegetables. There are interesting beers to enjoy, and they pride themselves on cocktails, something that should go down well with Broad Street's Saturday night partygoers.In restaurant chains run by men in suits rather than chefs, the food often gets forgotten in favour of the theme, the service and the upselling. So while we had a lovely, friendly hostess, and were treated to a swish leather booth of our own the experience could quite easily have been improved by putting fresh (rather than tinned) tomato in the salsa, by offering vegetarians something other than goats' cheese, and by providing a better standard of cooking in general. Starters were fine, and generously sized. Five beer-battered prawns (£7.95) arrived crisp and ale-flavoured, accompanied by Cajun mayonnaise. The spicy calarmari (£6.75) was well judged, neither too raw nor too rubberlike.

My main of three sliders with fries and slaw (£13.95) was fine, neither memorably good nor terribly bad. The patties lacked that savoury unctuousness found in a great burger, but were well presented with a variety of toppings - pulled pork, blue cheese, bacon. My friend's fajita was passable; seasoned chicken breast served on a sizzling stone with softened onions and peppers, with separate tortillas and toppings to roll your own. A simple dish, not worth £15.75. By this point we'd both worked our way through too much fried carbohydrate to cope with desserts, which included cheesecake, brownies and ice-cream. Coast-to-Coast offers the kind of easy-to-please food you'd expect on a family menu; something for everyone. The downside is the prices - a simple two-course dinner for two (no booze) cost upwards of £50 - acceptable if you're getting good cooking, not so great for what was essentially burger and chips. Vegetarians get a bad deal, with very little variety - and there's no information on either the menu or the website about where the seafood, meat and poultry are sourced. I can only assume that it's bought in as cheaply as possible, making the prices even more outrageous. I suppose that recent refit's got to be paid for

somehow. Coast-to-Coast is a fun place, good for evenings out with friends and family. Just make sure that someone else is paying. *Helen Stallard*
