News

Where light in darkness lies...

A light-tastic event has been added to the Shakespeare Birthplace Trust's autumn calendar. Fusing a 3D lightshow with theatrical performances from resident acting troupe Shakespeare Aloud, The Shakespeare Birthplace Lightshow sees some of The Bard's most dramatic scenes performed outside Stratford's popular venue, with visitors also invited to tour the Birthplace by candlelight. The shows run from 22 November to 19 December, each day taking place at half-hourly intervals between 4.30pm and 7.30pm. For further information, visit www.shakespeare.org.uk.



West Bromwich arts centre to close

West Bromwich arts centre The Public is to close. The venue, which opened in 2008, cost £72million to build and is receiving a £30,000 per week subsidy from Sandwell Council. The council has now decided it can no longer justify subsidising the attraction. A petition calling for the centre to be saved has been signed by approximately five thousand people. The curtain falls at The Public on 30 November, with scheduling being honoured until that time.



Major investment for Shropshire venue

An award-winning Centre of Excellence in Shropshire, used as a training facility by many of the UK's elite athletes, has been turned into a multi-million pound state-of-the-art conference, meeting and exhibition venue. Funded by Sport England, the £6.9million refurbishment of Lilleshall National Sports Centre will enable the Telford venue to compete with some of the country's top conferencing providers.



Niki Evans to star in musical's debut tour

Following successes as Mrs Johnstone in Willy Russell's Blood Brothers and Paulette in Legally Blonde, Tamworth lass Niki Evans is set to hit the road again, this time to appear alongside Darren Day in the first-ever UK tour of the musical comedy The 25th Annual Putnam Spelling Bee. The Tony Award-nominated show is based on the lives of six quirky adolescents who've entered into the 'Bee' - a competition in which contestants are challenged to spell a variety of words. Niki stars as judge and former Bee champion Rona Lisa Peretti, who's caught the eye of the senior judge, Vice Principal Patch, played by Day. The show is touring to eleven UK venues, including Birmingham's Crescent Theatre, where it stops off for one night only on 14 October.

The former nineteenth century residence of the Duke of Sutherland, the centre has been transformed into a modern space which can facilitate up to three hundred-and-sixty delegates. The venue boasts thirteen conference and meeting rooms, a one hundred-and-sixty-six-seat lecture theatre, an exhibition hall, four-star campus-style accommodation, and full dining and hospitality facilities. New acquisition for Gaydon...

Gaydon's Heritage Motor Centre (HMC) has acquired a unique model of MG's recordbreaking EX135 car. The acquisition has been made courtesy of a generous grant from Arts Council England's PRISM Fund. EX135 was the first 1100cc-engine car to exceed 200mph, Major ATG 'Goldie' Gardner claiming the record in Germany in 1939. Of the new acquisition, Stephen Laing, Curator of HMC, commented: "It's fantastic to reunite the model with EX135, adding another piece of the story of MG's record-breaking achievements. It's also great to return the model to the Midlands, as it was made not so far from here, by Willmot of Birmingham."

Birmingham venue to host BBC comedy award semi-final

The semi-final of a prestigious competition to unearth the UK's best up-and-coming comic talent is to take place at Birmingham's Glee Club in November. Hosted by Patrick Kielty, the BBC Radio New Comedy Award aims to 'find the best new stand-up talent throughout the land'. Previous finalists have included

Alan Carr, Peter Kay and Sarah Millican. The semi-final will be filmed at the Hurst Street venue on 26 November and broadcast live on BBC Radio Four Extra.

New Birmingham landmark opens its doors.

This month sees the long-awaited opening of the iconic Library of Birmingham (on 3 September). Standing proud in Centenary Square, the multi-million pound development is Europe's largest public library, and a significant addition to the cultural landscape of the second city. Expected to attract in excess of three million visitors each year, the library will be home to Birmingham's world-class collection of archives, photography and rare books including four thousand books available on the venue's public floors. A Discovery Season, featuring numerous events inspired by the archives and collections services, marks the opening of the library, as does 4Squares Weekender, a cultural event taking place in the city centre from 6 to 8 September (see pages 57 to 73).

Third Ceramics Biennial launches in Stoke

This month sees the launch of the third Stoke-on-Trent British Ceramics Biennial, showcasing the best of the UK's contemporary ceramics. The 2013 festival (28 September - 10 November) brings a strong international flavour to the city, with work from over thirty Scandinavian artists displayed alongside pieces from thirty-five of 'the best of the current crop of UK ceramic graduates'. The event is offering a £10,000 award to the artist who most displays 'exceptional creativity in their work'. Three venues - the China Hall at the original Spode factory site, the AirSpace Gallery, and the Potteries Museum & Art Gallery - will each host a variety of exhibitions. A Guerrilla Ceramics Trail and Artists' Soup Kitchen are just two of the associated events. For further information, visit www.britishceramicsbiennial.com

Birmingham to host Europe's first major photorealism retrospective

A new exhibition devoted entirely to photorealism opens at Birmingham Museum & Art Gallery in November. The first and largest display of its kind in Europe, Photorealism: 50 Years Of Hyperrealistic Painting showcases paintings by all the major photorealists - including Birmingham-born artist John Salt, whose work more recently featured at Ikon Gallery. Of the museum's impending exhibition, Andy Horn, Head of Exhibitions, said: "Not

since the 1970s has there been the opportunity to view so many photorealist paintings in one place. This exhibition - the first in Europe to gather all the star names of the genre - is a real coup for Birmingham Museum & Art Gallery." The exhibition runs until 30 March 2014.





Welcome home!

The REP returns to Centenary Square





Having spent a nomadic two-and-a-half years working out of other city theatres and arts venues, The REP this month returns to its newly revamped home in Centenary Square to start a new chapter in its history; a chapter which sees Birmingham's only major producing theatre integrated with the city's new multi-million pound development and latest landmark, the Library of Birmingham. What's On recently caught up with Artistic Director Roxana Silbert to talk about the changes...

What excites you most about the newly revamped Birmingham Rep, Roxana? Obviously the new three hundred-seater theatre is a blessing, and the thought of the works that we're able to do in it is really exciting. It's just opened up all sorts of options, not only in terms of collaborating with the new Library of Birmingham, but in terms of the kind of shows which we can now do - pieces which would be exposed in the main house, but at the same time would have been squeezed into The Door. That, in itself, is a huge gift. And I think what's been done with the public spaces is really exciting. It really opens the theatre up to the outside world. It's very accessible, allowing people just to pop in off the street. To mark the relaunch, we're going to open with an exhibition which continues the work of The Rep 100. It will be wonderful to put things into that space which make it interactive.

And what about companies and performers visiting The REP?

The studio is amazing and the rehearsal rooms are to die for, because they're large, have natural light and are also really quiet. I can't tell you how many rehearsal rooms I've been in where there's no natural light and it's absolutely freezing, so just being able to rehearse somewhere like we've now got at The REP will make an enormous difference. It's all very lovely, but I think the real success of the revamp is the public space.

What are the most noticeable differences for theatre-goers?

We'll now be able to offer a much broader range of work. I think people will be more comfortable - the seats are better, the airconditioning is better, the access is better. We have far better catering facilities and, as well as a new restaurant, there will be portable drinks facilities, which can give a cabaret feel to spaces like The Door when needed. There's also a child area, where mums can come along and hang out with their kids. Generally, it'll just be a far more welcoming place. The catering side of things is also very exciting. We're working with Searcy's, an amazing catering company who run the catering at The Barbican and The National Portrait Gallery - so the quality of refreshments and food that we can offer visitors to the restaurant, as well as visiting companies and businesses, is a lot higher. There are banqueting suites which are dedicated to renting for businesses. We won't use those for any kind of artistic activity; they're there purely to maximise potential revenue. There was a focus when putting the building together that would allow us to maximise the business income without sacrificing the artistic output, and that's been the balance to find.

The new building design was agreed before your time at The REP. If you'd have had any involvement, is there anything you'd have done differently?

Not at this stage. What will be interesting to me is to see how the building is used, the flow of people, and how the new entrance, which links us to the Library, affects people coming in. I don't think you really know until a few months into a building being used if there are things that maybe could have been done differently.

How will your partnership with the Library of Birmingham work?

In terms of access, there are now two entrances into The REP. One is the old entrance, with which people will be familiar, the other is a joint entrance with the Library of Birmingham. This is a sort of shared area, with clearly marked areas either side from which to access The REP on the left and the library on the right. This means there's a lot more public space, it will be more creative and there'll be a lot more going on. For example, the Library is launching a Magic Lantern Festival, and we're commissioning two artists to create installations for that event in our spaces. Then there's the studio space itself, which belongs to the library but which The REP is running - the technicians and the people who run the space on a dayto-day basis are from The REP. That's a very connected space, so when we have our programming meetings, we have them together. We have to negotiate and agree how we're going to use the space. There are lots of things that we're both interested in. For example, they're hosting The Writers Festival, and we're presenting an unproduced play, Denmark Hill, by Alan Bennett, because there's a shared interest in that sort of thing. Hopefully that's how things will grow. Generally we have two very distinct identities but will be looking for opportunities where they can merge.

What are you most looking forward to in the opening programme?

I'm really looking forward to the opening week, because we've got a show in every space. They're all very different to each other, and I'm excited at seeing those different audiences come together under one roof. The whole programming is quite eclectic - it's eclectic on purpose, and will hopefully draw an eclectic audience. As for performances, I wouldn't want to single out a particular show because it's all about trying to appeal to lots of different people via lots of different bodies of work.

Long-term, what plans have you got as Artistic Director?

I'd like to do two things - and, in a way, that opening week will be a statement of intent. I want to bring the best work possible to Birmingham, and at the same time give opportunities to new and emerging talent. For me, it was very important that we didn't open with a home-grown show, because I believe a lot of the focus will be on the building. The great thing about Alan Bennett's People is that it's a show that


already exists. It doesn't need the reviewing or the type of critical response that much new work does. It's by the country's best writer, it's a National Theatre production, and I wanted to open with something that would be of national, and international, quality. In the studio, we've got Soweto Kinch, who's a local artist with an international reputation. Then, in The Door, we've got a work by a young director and young writer. The Door is about launching the careers of people who will hopefully be the next generation of 'national treasures', if you like.

Finally, what are your thoughts about Birmingham and the Midlands' arts profile at the moment?

Lots of companies from across the West Midlands recently got together to discuss how we want to push theatre across the region forward. It was incredibly positive and energetic, despite some hideous financial situations. I think the arts scene is especially vibrant at the moment, which is just amazing. Our plan is to work together, to support each other and move forward.

Facts and figures about The REP

- The new STUDIO occupies 357sqm. The flexible and easily adaptable auditorium enables performances to take place in a number of stage formats, including proscenium, open-end stage, thrust, traverse, promenade, and flat floor. The area of The STUDIO can also be raised to 3m-high by stage elevators, enabling more intimate events such as author readings to take place during the day without having to strike or alter the set of a REP production in the evenings.
- Two new rehearsal rooms, measuring 207sqm and 164sqm, offer better facilities for acting companies, with sprung floors, mirrored and draped walls, sound-proofing and lots of natural daylight.
- Ellisons, the UK's leading supplier to the hair and beauty industry, have generously helped The REP with fitting out the theatre's new wigs and make-up department.
- The backstage refurbishment includes four new apartments for use by visiting directors, designers and performers. The apartments have been designed and furnished by IKEA Birmingham, along with a new green room and public foyer lighting installation. All fittings, furnishings and designs have generously been provided by IKEA Birmingham.
- The TREATS, a new retail outlet in the foyer, will sell ice creams, sweets, snacks, programmes, play texts and merchandise.
- The fourteen dressing rooms are now all en-suite and can accommodate up to fifty-six actors at any one time.
- The REP re-opens with Alan Bennett's People on 3 September.

exploring Voltaire's Candide for the RSC...









Often described as the 'greatest modern-day playwright', Mark Ravenhill's work ranges from the controversial 1995 play Shopping And F***ing through to much-acclaimed adaptations of Bertolt Brecht's The Mother and Life Of Galileo. His latest work, based on Voltaire's Candide, is currently showing at Stratford's Swan Theatre. What's On caught up with Mark to talk about what audiences can expect from this latest offering, his involvement in the sitcom Vicious, and why he feels he could never write for The Archers or Dr Who...

Why choose Voltaire's Candide to explore for the RSC, Mark?

Basically it's just a book that I've always really liked. I first read it a long time ago, and over the years I've re-read it on numerous occasions. Whenever I come back to it, I stumble across something new. The writing is very fresh and funny, and it makes me laugh - and although I've read it many times, it still just comes off the page every time. The great thing about the original book by Voltaire is that, although it's inspired by ideas and philosophy, it can be read almost as a fairytale/adventure story. That said, over the years, I've become a bit more tuned-in to its philosophical side.

And it's something you can read in small chunks and still get an understanding about, as proved by your bitesize tweets of the story...

Yeah, each sentence is very simple and very elegant, and there's always a little spring and a bit of irony in them. So it breaks down really well to tweet.

What's the most recent revelation that you've found with the text?

The text seems really simple, but within that simplicity are a wealth of paradoxes which leave you thinking. Like with the last line, 'we must cultivate our garden'. What does that mean? Should we forget the world and just think about our own plot of land? Is that the solution to the problem. If we all did that, would everything be okay, or is there a cruelty in ignoring the wider picture and looking after just oneself? It's a sentence that can leave you pondering for days...

Is there a moral to the tale?

No, I think we'd probably expect something like this to have a moral, but actually I think it's more about making you think about things, rather than teaching you something. I think what Voltaire set out to do was to satirise his optimism, which was the new, fashionable, philosophical thing - that we were living in the best of all possible worlds. His initial impulse was to satirise that, but I think the book leaves you with lots of questions, so I've used this as a starting point and written an original play one which is for now and for us, but which still takes some of the questions from the book. It starts off as an adaptation of Voltaire's Candide, then changes to a modern setting with modern characters and becomes its own play.

Which, from what I've read, is quite gruesome...

There are some gruesome bits, yes, but it's not as gruesome as my first ever Shakespeare play. It's funny how you'd expect that from a classic, but not so much from a modern play.

What influenced you most when finding the level for this modern-day setting?

Optimism was Voltaire's starting point, and I wanted that to be mine too. In our everyday lives we're pretty optimistic, perhaps more so than ever. In my grandparents', and even my parents', generation, if you asked people how they were, they'd more often than not reply "Oh, I mustn't grumble...", whereas our generation is more likely to respond, "yeah, I'm doing great. Fantastic!". We're almost expected to always be upbeat, but I think a lot of people have become guite frightened about the whole ecology of the world, and whether there's going to be a planet for our kids and grandchildren. I think we're very fearful. I think we have, in a broader sense of the word, a darker outlook than our parents, but on the front of things we're able to project a happier persona. I think that gap between our optimism and our pessimism is quite interesting, even from a generation ago.

You've expressed your favour for the use of parallel universes in your works. What advantages does this provide for you as a playwright and for your audiences?

Reading Candide originally, one of the pennies that dropped was that this everyday word 'optimism' was very new at the time. It had a very specific meaning, more like optimal. This was supported by the idea that God had created numerous universes and had decided to put us in the optimal universe. I thought yeah, lots of different universes! Wouldn't it be good to stand in a bubble and look at the numerous versions? I liked that notion, and I think it's something which we can relate to as contemporary people. The idea of there being lots of versions of reality is nowadays very popular, as has been shown by the volume of sci-fi available. In terms of theatre, I think it's just fun. It means you can set up a number of different worlds. There are five in this play, each with its own mood, its own colour, its own experience, and they can all be played off against each other. I think in theatrical terms it's quite fun to have five different versions of reality.

You've requested that, where people are able to, they read Voltaire's original work before visiting The Swan to see this particular production. Is that a realistic ask?

It's only about one hundred pages long. I think it would be quite nice for people to read, because it's one of those books that a lot of people will have heard of and would be interested in. I'd like to encourage people, and it's amazing how many people do read the Shakespeare plays before they come to see them. It helps give individuals a greater understanding of what's happening on stage. What's great about the RSC audiences is that they want to be entertained but they also want to take something away from their experiences.

You've been writer-in-residence at the RSC for eighteen months. What's been the biggest learning-curve during your time there?

It's a big organisation, so learning about all the different people and how it all works has taken time. I was already seeing a lot of the RSC's work, but just to see everything in that period and get to know people and how the company works has been quite an experience. There's so much that's inspired me as a writer.

You've adapted two pieces by Brecht - The Mother and Life Of Galileo. Do you have a particular affinity with his work?

I do really like Brecht plays. There's a real clarity in his storytelling, and one of the things I was really keen on with Galileo was the spark and vigour in the language. He was first and foremost a poet, writing a poem almost every day of his life, and he produced pieces which had a sort of elegance, which were at the same time witty and sharp. I think some English versions have made Brecht a bit woolly and heavy. What I wanted to try and capture was an English equivalent for that real speed of force and energy of thought which is there in the German. What I've tried to do is allow the excitement and the energy of the language and the ideas to come through.

You've been writing for a number of years now. How has your writing evolved over that period?

Hopefully it's got better! I've become more confident writing for a bigger cast. We've got sixteen people in Candide, and just being able to hold in your head the idea of sixteen people on stage is quite a challenge. Just practical things like that take a while, I think. When I first started writing, just imagining a scene with three of four people was quite daunting.


You had huge success with the controversial Shopping And F***ing, and you're often still defined by the play. Does that concern you?

No, not really, because I think it's a great thing to have. That play toured for a number of years, was seen by lots of people and is still on university syllabuses, so it connects with a lot of people. It's great that there's one play which lots of people know, and it's a good starting point. Inevitably, when you first start writing a play, you base your characters around your own age group. Then, when you get older and more confident, you start to bring in a broader age-range of characters.

So does that confidence now mean you're prepared to tackle a whole new range of subject matter?

Although you like to think as a writer that you could write about pretty much anything, there are some things that you'd love to write about but the subjects don't seem to come naturally to you.






Anything in particular?

Funnily enough, someone once asked me if I'd like to write for The Archers, which I love, but as I've never lived in a village and the programme includes some really specific stuff about farming which I know nothing about, I didn't feel I was very well equipped. That said, I did once sit in a room with someone who was going to agriculture college and, entirely based on The Archers, I was able to have this whole conversation about 'Setti Side'. Afterwards, he asked me how I knew so much about 'Setti Side', and I had to confess that I'd learned it all from The Archers!

You're a fan of Doctor Who. Would you ever consider writing for the series?
Yeah, I did speak to them once, a couple of years ago. Again, as with The Archers, it's quite a specific genre, so I'm not sure whether I could do it. I'd be quite intrigued to find out, but I suspect I'd be a bit rubbish. I might like watching Premier League football, but I wouldn't want to find myself in the middle of a Premier League football match.

Where did your theatrical journey begin? I suppose I've always worked in the theatre, although originally I was mainly directing. I do understand theatre, and I do think that playwriting came out of my general excitement and enthusiasm in making theatre. Writing was just one of the forms that my enthusiasm took. For me, it's all part of the same thing - acting, directing, writing, producing; it's all just 'making theatre'. As a child I would perform whenever I could, in amateur musicals and school plays.

Was the prospect of becoming a playwright always on your radar?

When I was really little I used to make up plays in my bedroom and get my brother to be in them. I didn't make any distinction between the different roles, and even when I was at school and performing in amateur productions, I didn't think about the writing. As far as I was concerned, the writing was something which had been done years and years before. I'd never even met a living playwright. Gradually, at university, I became interested in directing, and then, having directed a new play, I became interested in what it was like to write a play.

More recently you co-created the sitcom Vicious. How did that come about?

I wrote a play which Ian McKellan was in at the Donmar Theatre. Talking to lan, I realised that he and Derek Jacobi had been to university together and had known each other since they were nineteen. Ian commented that no one had ever written anything for the two of them to appear in together, and that if anybody ever did, they'd probably be up for it. So when someone asked for an idea for a sitcom, I said, "yeah, it would be great to have lan and Derek as this old gay couple who can't live with but can't live without each other". It started from there, really. I just came up with the idea, the title and the situation, and an American writer, Gary Janetti, wrote the script.

How would you respond to some people's comments that Vicious 'perpetuates a stereotype'?

It's been really interesting, and it's certainly divided people. Yeah, I think in some ways he's writing about old-fashioned, pre-1960s gay men. I can see a lot of the criticisms, and

I'm aware that it caused proper stand-up rows between people, some of whom found it really offensive. But actually, when I first sat down to watch it on TV, I found I was immediately laughing out loud. I remember thinking to myself; this is a sitcom and I'm laughing, so I think it's working. Despite what my PC head tells me, as long as I'm laughing, then it's passed the comedy test and I'm happy with that, but I can see both sides of the argument.

Was it modelled on anyone in particular? No, I just liked lan's idea. The fact that they'd known each other so long fed into something, and the two of them get on really, really well. But there is - and I know this more from lan's side than from Derek's - a certain amount of rivalry there, and you can see that over the years they've played very similar parts. Ian once revealed in an interview that one day, when he was reading the whole of Homer's Odyssey, he discovered that, down the road, Derek was reading the same piece for a rival talkingbook thing. I think they've had that throughout their careers, so that sort of fed into the initial concept.

And can we expect a second series?
All I know is that Derek and lan aren't available until 2015. I think there's interest on all parts for a second series but it certainly won't be next year.

You've just returned from Edinburgh, where you gave a speech at The Fringe, asking for theatre companies to be 'more daring, dangerous and naughty' in their choice of work. Can you expand on that?

This was the first such event - and, as with the Television Festival, they now want a Keynote Lecture at the launch of The Fringe every year. I just think that, in the last twenty years, there's been a lot of really good work in the arts, but a lot of companies have become very well behaved and good at filling in their forms, choosing the right 'art speak' and ticking the right boxes. I think there's a sort of collective illusion that the last few years have been a bit bumpy in terms of funding but that, at some point, the clock's going to be turned back and normal service will be resumed. I don't think that's a realistic expectation, and it provides an opportunity to start thinking differently; not always to think about what's the safest and nicest way to behave so as to attract funding. I want people to be more buccaneering. I think nowadays a lot of young people, as they're breaking through with their shows, are having to train themselves in corporate 'art

And what are your thoughts on recent research which indicates that many audiences are currently less inclined to take risks with new work?

It think it does vary. I've always liked it when I've written a new play and it's toured outside London. You can get quite locked in to the same people going to see the same sort of plays in London. There's a 'new play audience', which often means there's a thick set of responses. If, by contrast, your play goes to, say, Theatre Royal Bath, then it may well be the only new play they've seen all year, so they'll often respond to it in a different way. That's what I love about audiences at Stratford - they're not just locked into seeing lots of new plays or lots of classics, but a variety of different works. And

the responses are certainly more direct and honest.

Of all the works you've written, which has had the most effect on you personally?

You tend to do a bit of a stock-take of your life and the world with each play you write, but you do sort of put everything that you have into the play that you're working on at any given moment. Certainly Shopping And F***ing, which was written on the kitchen table while I was doing numerous part-time jobs, was what set me off as a professional playwright, so I suppose in that respect that one changed my life.

What sowed the seed for that particular play?

I was reading and directing a lot of new plays, and although I thought a lot of them were good, there wasn't anything out there which completely summed up how I felt it was to be alive and to be the age I was when I wrote Shopping And F***ing. I'm probably quite a lazy person, and I was just waiting and waiting for someone to come up with a play which portrayed that. When it didn't happen, I decided to write it myself. I was writing the play I wanted to see, really and that's still how I work today. I wait around to see if someone writes the play that I want to see, and if it doesn't materialise then I have a go at doing it myself.


You're often described as the 'greatest modern-day playwright'. Does that give you a confidence to try anything?

Yes, to try anything, but it's not a forgone conclusion that it'll work! The actual craft of putting a play together is always much bigger than you are. You can spend a few months swanning around and talking to students who're studying your play on the syllabus, or you can go to other countries which are producing your plays, go on TV, talk about yourself and feel very, very grand. But actually, when you sit down and start writing scenes, everything else goes out of the window, because the actual craft of putting a play together is always hard and is always very challenging. It's not so hard that I don't want to do it, but the actual problem of solving things always makes you think that you're starting all over again. It's all very exciting, and it's what keeps me going.

Finally, as a playwright, what would you like your lasting legacy to be?

I guess I do think a little bit about posterity. Wouldn't it be amazing if some of the stuff that you wrote could outlive you, and if perhaps in one hundred, two hundred years' time, someone picks up one of your texts and thinks 'let's try and make something of this'. I assume it's alright to hope that someone you're never going to meet and never going to know about may one day pick up your work and want to study it.

Paul Michael Glaser

fiddling about in the Midlands...





Best remembered as one half of TV's most memorable cop duo Starsky And Hutch, veteran American actor Paul Michael Glaser is about to appear in one of his favourite musicals, playing Tevye in Craig Revel Horwood's staging of the much-loved musical Fiddler On The Roof, which stops off in the Midlands next month. What's On recently caught up with Paul to talk about his impending visit to UK shores...

So what's the personal appeal for you in playing Tevye, Paul?

He's a wonderful character, and I really relate to him. He's a bit of an everyman, and he's trying to find his way and reconcile himself to how life is changing. Fiddler has a universal message, and I think that's one of the things responsible for the musical being so successful over the years. I have a real empathy with him, and playing him allows me so many of the things Starsky allowed me. I got to perform a whole range of emotions, and Tevye is very much like that. Another thing that I love about him is that he talks to the audience. He lets them in on his problems. He almost talks to them as his alter-ego. And the role has also given me an excuse to grow a beard!

Is it true that you've only ever seen snippets of the show before?

When I was a young actor, doing a play in New York with the British actor Donald Pleasence, we were appearing at a venue next to the theatre where Fiddler On The Roof was playing - the two stage doors were opposite each other. I happened to be seeing a girl in the Fiddler company, and since my show finished about ten minutes before the end of Fiddler, I'd quickly get changed, meet this young lady, and we'd stand in the wings and watch the last five minutes of the performance every night.

But then you went on to appear in the film version...

Yeah, for years after catching snippets in New York I'd find myself humming tunes from Fiddler. Then, later, I was offered the role of Perchick, who falls in love with one of Tevye's daughters, in the 1971 film version of the musical.

So will audiences notice many differences between Craig Revel Horwood's staging and the original version?

Craig wants to stay true to the original musical, but this new version will have a seventeen-piece orchestra featuring actor/musicians who'll be on the stage, as opposed to in the orchestra pit. For me, that's a new approach, and brings a new dimension that I think will be very interesting.

Will it appeal to a younger audience?

I think that we underestimate our youth in terms of what they like, what they understand and what they have an affinity for. For fifty years Fiddler has been a musical which has touched people all over the world - from Japan, Russia, Europe, you name it. It's been everywhere. It has to appeal to all kinds of people to have enjoyed success at such a universal level.

Fiddler features some of musical theatre's most iconic songs. Are you a natural singer?

I've always enjoyed singing - although when I was in college, my roommates used to flush the toilet when I sang in the shower. If I had a

nickel for every time someone said 'stick to acting', I'd probably be a rich man. I love singing, and I think I have a good voice. I came over to England to do a couple of pantos. I did Peter Pan and Aladdin, and the reason I did those was that I wanted to get on stage and sing. I really enjoyed that, so when I was asked to do this, I simply jumped at the chance. I love the interaction that you have with audiences in panto, and it's something that I'm also looking forward to with playing Tevye.

As an accomplished actor, are there any new disciplines you'll need to master for the role?

I feel very comfortable with it, but that can be both good news and bad news. I imagine maintaining the level of performance for so long could need a bit of discipline. Beyond that, and having to pull a wagon without a horse, I don't really have any concerns.

It's quite a long tour. How do you plan to make the most of your downtime in the UK?

I haven't decided yet. I'll be packing everything up and putting my things into storage, so I guess I'll be footloose and fancy free. I think when the tour is over I'll probably want to go to a warm climate, but I don't know whether I'll come back to the US or go some place else. The whole experience is fascinating to me, because it's a bit like taking a deck of cards and throwing it up in the air and seeing where it lands. It'll be a bit of an adventure, which is both exciting and scary at the same time. I look forward to it.

Away from the stage, you've recently become a published author, with your book Chrystallia And The Source Of Light. Was writing something you always wanted to do?

I always liked it. Unfortunately, in my formative years at school, I didn't get as far as I'd have liked. When I started doing Starsky And Hutch, I started writing dialogue, and that continued once I began directing. When the directing stopped, I started to develop a script that I'd written previously. Then, about fifteen years ago, I wrote a screenplay, but there wasn't the technology at the time to develop it, so I decided to write it as a book. The thing that I find fascinating about writing is that it reveals so much to you about yourself. I realised quite quickly that I was writing about what I'd learned about loss and helplessness during my journey through life. I decided I wanted to share this with people, so I wrote a book which I believe appeals to the child in all of us. I wrote a story in the entertainment tradition of Alice In Wonderland and The Wizard Of Oz, with lots of imaginative characters and strange happenings. Chrystallia And The Source Of Light is the story of a fourteen-year-old girl, told in her voice, her nine-year-old brother and their last Christmas with their mum, who's not well. It's also their last Christmas in their house, because the bank is kicking them out. The girl is angry, but believes in the need to believe, and the children soon find themselves on a journey to this underground medieval kingdom, where everything and everybody is made of mineral and crystal. To a certain extent, it's a metaphor for my life, and at its heart it's very entertaining and enjoyable. It's aimed at kids from nine to sixteen, but I'd like whole families to read it out loud, because it answers an important question: 'what's the purpose of fear in our lives?'. The motivating force behind this whole thing was a tremendous desire to share what I'd learned, and to present it in such a way that people could take it in, enjoy it and learn from it. It's all quite spiritual.

You briefly mentioned Starsky And Hutch, and it's for your role as Dave Starsky that you're best known. Do you look back at that time in your career with great fondness?

I enjoy it far more in retrospect than I enjoyed doing it. I have lots of great memories from the show and that time, but it was also a real rollercoaster ride, because all of a sudden it was the best thing since sliced bread.

Do you see this return to live theatre as opening the door to more theatrical roles in the future?

It could well do that, or it could send me to the farm! That's not being negative; that's pragmatic. If the role's good, then I'd be up for it. After all, theatre is the actor's medium.

Is there a particular role you'd really like to play?

I've always liked Tevye. He's always been on my list. It may be presumptuous of me, but I've always thought that Henry Higgins in My Fair Lady would be a good role to play. At my age, I don't really spend a lot of time thinking 'God, I'd like to play this', or 'I'd like to play that'. I go where my creative side takes me; if it's writing, it's writing, if it's acting, it's acting, if it's directing, and if it's golf, it's golf. It's just like that...

Finally, would you say there's a difference between how theatre is received in the UK and the US?

I think British audiences are much more sophisticated in terms of their appreciation of theatre. In England, theatre's always been held in far greater esteem. In America, everything is far more commercialised. Obviously, commercialism is happening all over the world, but America is leading the way in threatening the creative impulses of society. The English have always respected their theatre much more, and I feel honoured to be able to present myself as this character over in the UK.

Dust off your eyeliner and pirate shirts... Visage are back in Birmingham! Pioneers of the New Romantic movement, Visage emerged in 1978 from London club Blitz, where founders Steve Strange and Rusty Egan were hosting club nights and searching for new music. Creating the band with Midge Ure, they added Ultravox keyboardist Billy Currie and three quarters of Magazine to the line-up before going on to release best-known hit and club classic Fade To Grey (in 1980). Now the band is back with a new album, and will be playing songs both old and new on this Hearts And Knives tour.



The 1975

Manchester newcomers The 1975 have taken over the charts, and will release their hotly anticipated eponymous debut album two weeks before their Birmingham show. LG Arena, Birmingham, Mon 23 September



Rahat Fateh Ali Khan

A professional surfer until an accident at the age of seventeen left him with one hundred-and-fifty stitches and minus a few teeth, Jack is now a committed environmentalist and family man, as well as an award-winning artist. As with all his tours since 2008, Johnson will donate one hundred per cent of the profits to charity.



Gilmore And Roberts

Katriona Gilmore and Jamie Roberts joined forces in 2006, and have since released three albums, toured with Fairport Convention and been nominated for the Radio Two Horizon Award. An award-winning songwriter, Katriona is part of The Albion Band, and previously Tiny Tin Lady and Rosie Doonan's Snapdragons. Playing contemporary folk, they combine original songwriting with astounding lap-tapping guitar, fiery fiddle and trademark harmonies, in the process creating a powerful wall of sound.


The Ramona Flowers


Hare & Hounds, Birmingham, Thurs 19 September

Marmozets

The Slade Rooms, Wolverhampton, Fri 20 September

Following the musical tradition of keeping it in the family, Marmozets comprises members of not one but two broods - Becca, Sam and Josh Macintyr, and Jack and Will Bottomley. Playing shouty, energetic, post-punk math rock, the youngsters, aged between sixteen and twenty, have put out two EPs so far; Passive Aggressive and Vexed. Earning comparisons with Paramore and Bring Me The Horizon, they appear in Wolverhampton as part of a nine-date UK tour, their first as headliners. Local bands Lightfire and Mercians support.



Nick Harper

The Marr's Bar, Worcester, Sun 22 September He may not have enjoyed the critical acclaim of his famous, cult-hero father Roy, but there's no denying Nick Harper is a hugely talented and much-admired guitarist and singer-songwriter in his own right. And it's hardly surprising that he chose to follow in dad's footsteps and carve out a career for himself in music, given that much of his childhood was spent in the company of Roy's legion of famous friends - the likes of Keith Moon, Jimmy Page, Robert Plant and David Gilmour were all regular visitors to the Harper household. Best known as a solo artist, Nick also scored successes as a member of English New Wave band Squeeze, for whom he occasionally provided additional guitar and vocals.

The Carrivick Sisters

Henry Tudor House, Shrewsbury, Mon 23 September

Laura and Charlotte are identical twins from South Devon who play an original mix of bluegrass and folk-inspired songs. At the age of twenty-three, they've just released their fifth CD, From The Fields. Playing original songs, instrumentals and a few carefully chosen covers on the guitar, mandolin, banjo, dobro and fiddle, the duo have been praised for their sparkling harmonies, and enjoyed great success at Glastonbury in the summer.





Deacon Blue

Taking their name from the title of the Steely Dan song Deacon Blues, this Glaswegian pop band came together in 1985, releasing the highly regarded concept album Raintown two years later. Follow-up offering When The World Knows Your Name topped the UK album charts in 1989, with further albums being released in 1991 and '93, the latter just a year prior to the group splitting up. The band reformed on the eve of the twenty-first century, and have performed together on a part-time basis ever since.

Madina Lake

Breaking fans' hearts the world over, Madina Lake are calling it a day. After seven years, three albums and a gong for Best International Newcomer at the Kerrang! Awards 2007, the Chicago band are closing the book on the tale of Adalia's disappearance from the town of Madina Lake, the concept around which they were formed. dred performance dates a year, the band have a fast-growing fanbase, and offer a one-of-akind live show that's well worth catching.





Classical Music PREVIEWS



Britten Centenary: Peter Grimes

Symphony Hall, Birmingham, Thurs 26 September

Continuing Town Hall/Symphony Hall's (THSH) A Boy Was Born season - marking the centenary of Benjamin Britten - the London Philharmonic Orchestra here present what's often described as the legendary British composer's greatest work.

Both 'haunting and disturbing', Peter Grimes transports audiences to a fictional fishing village in Suffolk, where the principal character - here played by Stuart Skelton - stands alone against a suspicious, tight-knit community after his apprentice loses his life during a storm at sea. Having received much critical acclaim since it was first performed at Sadlers Wells in 1945, the three-and-a-half hour work is here directed by Russian conductor Vladimir Jurowski. This highly-recommended performance also features Pamela Armstrong (Ellen Orford), Alan Opie (Captain Balstrode), Pamela Helen Stephen (auntie), Brindley Sherratt (Swallow), Michaek Colvin (Bob Boles), and Malin Christensson and Claire Ormshaw as the nieces.

Nicola Benedetti

Acclaimed violinist Nicola Benedetti returns to Birmingham this month as part of her current Silver Violin tour, which sees the Brit Award-winner performing alongside cellist Leonard Elschenbroich and pianist Alexei Grynyuk. Held in high regard for her musicality, poise and ability to mesmerise audiences with her playing, Benedetti here fronts an eclectic programme. John Williams' theme from Schindler's List, Korngold's Marietta's Lied from Die tote Stadt, Saint-Saëns' Introduction and Rondo Capriccioso, and Tchaikovsky's Piano Trio in A minor, Op 50 are among the works being performed.

Anyone who's ever put their faith in the British summer, bought a ticket for an outdoor show, and then spent the entire time doing a passable impersonation of a drowned rat will know only too well that the business of 'being sodden' can spectacularly undermine one's appreciation of a performance under the stars. And so it was, unfortunately, with Henry.

Umbrellas went up, umbrellas came down, umbrellas went up again. And all the while the actors did their very best to power their voices through the prevailing wind, the increased need to project meaning their performances were so much less subtle than they might otherwise have been. The cast were certainly wholehearted in their attempts to entertain, and they just as certainly needed to be - the audience was palpably distracted by the conditions, with regular visits to the dryness and relative warmth of the refreshments tent being an all too appealing idea.

This trilogy had much to recommend it. It deserved a better fate than a day spent doing battle with the elements. Alex Dyle



Strictly Confidential

Symphony Hall, Birmingham

A Strictly Come Dancing offshoot bounced back into Birmingham this summer with a couple of hot dates at Symphony Hall.

This time, it came not with a judging line-up but with a smattering of the series' most popular faces. The show provided plenty of behind-the-scenes trivia and showbiz gossip, as well as many of the best Latin and ballroom routines. Hence its title - Strictly Confidential.

Host Lisa Riley talked and danced her way through the story of her career and her family, and explained how her beloved Strictly had given her a new lease of life both professionally and personally. My two favourite dancers were there too: longlegged Aussie Natalie Lowe and Russian heartthrob Artem Chigvintsev, who let slip how he fell in love with his dancing partner (and eventual 2010 winner) Kaira Tointon.

The show was ideal for fans wanting a summertime Strictly fix before the new series starts in the autumn. *Anita Champaneri*



Evita

Grand Theatre, Wolverhampton

In a role previously performed by some of musical theatre's finest, Madalena Alberto shone as brightly as the diamonds that often adorned the neck of Argentina's first lady, Eva Peron. With an undisputably impressive vocal range, she perfectly manoeuvred her way through some of Tim Rice and Andrew Lloyd Webber's most iconic and heartfelt musical numbers. Her rendition of Don't Cry For Me Argentina was up there with the best. Alberto was sure-footed throughout, guiding the character of Peron from her days as a self-assured actress who became the voice of the Argentinian people through to her tragically early demise at the age of thirty-three - the final scene leaves you breathless.

Elsewhere, Sarah McNicholas' rendition of Another Suitcase... is simply sublime, while Wet Wet Wet frontman Marti Pellow's animated portrayal of the revolutionary Che said much for his versatility as a performer. His raspy tones were perfect for narrating Peron's rise to fame and fortune, and he certainly delivered on his promise to bring something of himself to the role.

Credible performances also come from Mark Heenehan, as Juan Peron, and from Nic Gibney, who, as Eva's first love Magaldi, is the person credited with influencing her in her formative years.

A wonderful production, much deserving of its standing ovation. Patsy Moss ■■■■■



Keeping Up Appearances: Fashion Through Two World Wars

Evening gowns, day-dresses, workwear and underwear are all present and correct in this intriguing new show, which charts the story of women's history from 1900 to the 1950s through the clothes that they wore. The sixty-year period under the spotlight saw a more profound change in the role and status of women than any other comparable period of time in history. Not surprisingly, these changes were reflected in the fashions of the period, with restrictive corsets being rejected in favour of practical workwear, and dresses becoming more daring as the women of the era sought a much-needed distraction from the horrors of war.







Paul Kaynes

talks about Birmingham's latest cultural offering...

As one of the steering team behind this month's 4 Squares Weekender, which celebrates the opening of the new Library of Birmingham, Paul Kaynes is well placed to assess the city's evergrowing status as a 'cultural hotspot'. What's On recently caught up with him to ask about what's in store for visitors to Birmingham between 6 and 8 September, his future plans as Director of Creative Programmes at The Hippodrome, and his shared vision for the Southside district of the city.

For those not in the know, Paul, what does the role of Director of Creative Programmes entail?

My job is to oversee everything that the Hippodrome does beyond the main stage. That includes education and community programmes, outdoor or festival programmes - like Summer In Southside - all of our access work and special projects like 4 Squares.

So where did the initial concept for 4 Squares come from?

It all started before I arrived here. It came about from a discussion that I know the Chief Executive of the Birmingham Arts Partnership had in relation to the opening of the new Library of Birmingham. It's such a significant moment for Birmingham, and is probably the biggest cultural opening in the UK this year - and maybe for many years to come, given the state of the country's economy. This is a very important, iconic moment in the history of Birmingham, and the arts or-

ganisation wanted to mark it - to say it's a cultural moment. And what better way than to put on an arts programme?

Could you see this becoming a regular event for the city?

I think it's too early to say. The Birmingham Arts Partnership is very interested in working together on large-scale events in the future, but what those large-scale events might be is not yet decided.

You mentioned Birmingham Arts Partnership. What's the long-term objective of BAP?

The Birmingham Arts Partnership has been working together for a year or two now, and they've got all sorts of initiatives - partly working together on large-scale projects like 4 Squares, partly working together on education and family projects, and partly seeing how we can make the most of the fantastic art scene that we have here in Birmingham.

The city has the most incredible range of arts organisations, artists and events happening, and I think that sometimes it isn't recognised in the city, or indeed in the rest of the UK. What we want to do is shout louder about that, and make sure people know just how good the arts sector is here.

There are currently fourteen members. Do you plan to build on that number by welcoming more people to the partnership? We already work with a much wider range of organisations, so whilst there are fourteen principal members, there are a lot more who are involved on projects like 4 Squares. We're working, for instance, with Flatpack Festival, B-Festival and others who aren't actually part of BAP but who are key partners in this particular event.

So is there a set criteria which arts organisations have to meet in order to have any involvement?

The fourteen principal members are the organisations that are funded at a significant level by the city council. Other members are added in for specific projects.

What are you most looking forward to seeing at 4 Squares?

It's very difficult to pick specific highlights but I would say As The World Tipped, because it's such a spectacular large-scale show. It really is a wonderful event. I've seen it before and it really is worth making the effort to come and see on the Friday or Saturday evening.

The best way of describing it is like a real-life disaster movie in the sky. The moment when the stage lifts and stops being a horizontal, and instead turns into a vertical stage, is a very special moment. What happens after that is simply spectacular...

It must be a mammoth task bringing something of this magnitude to Victoria Square? We're very fortunate in that both Wired Aerial Theatre, who are doing As The World Tipped, and No Fit State, who are doing Open House, are very used to working in this sort of urban environment. Wired Aerial Theatre have presented As The World Tipped to audiences all over the UK and across the world, so they've encountered all sorts of different spaces. There's not much you could ask them to do that they haven't already had to do somewhere else. Although the machinery that's needed on the square is quite significant, it's something which will fit very well in Victoria Square and will be quite spectacular.

Does the programming cover a broad spectrum, to cater for all ages and tastes?

Absolutely. The great thing about working with the fourteen BAP members is that between them they represent such a broad range of work, and therefore appeal to a very wide range of audiences. There's a very strong family-friendly focus in Oozells Square and Brindleyplace, and again in Centenary Square, where we've got the family-orientated Musical Picnic. For people who are particularly interested in Hip-Hop, Reggae and Sufi music, we've got The Drum's Simmer Down. Then, for people who are into drama, we've got things like The REP's EAT! show, which is happening in four caravans across the site. So with that range of organisations, and the opportunity to do things both in the daytime and evening, it's really a joy to be able to programme such a range of work for such a range of different audiences.

Beyond the festival, what do you think could further benefit Birmingham as a cultural hotspot?

Well, not least because of the festival, we certainly aim to get some notice for this event. We want Birmingham to be recognised for doing something which is exciting, fun and innovative. We want the people who come to this event to be more aware of what's on and what's available for them to come to in future months, whether they're residents or visitors to the city. By having had the experience of working together once like this, we very much hope that we'll be able to do it again.

Again, beyond the festival, if you had a free reign to bring any act you wanted to Birmingham, which would you choose? That's quite a difficult one, because I've got

lots that I'd love to see. In Derry this year, which is, of course, the City of Culture, there's been some fantastic work created by a choreographer called Mark Murphy and a company who specialise in all kinds of weird and wonderful stuff - including pyro - called Walk The Plank. They've collaborated to produce some really spectacular outdoor shows which, although I've not seen, I've heard about and seen footage of. I'd love to see if there's a way we could bring that particular partnership to Birmingham.

Does your job entail a lot of travelling and scouting?

It will do, but because I've only been in the post for three months and it's the summer, our focus has been on delivering this year's programme - and, indeed, 4 Squares. The plan for the future is that we should be looking around and seeing what great work we can bring to the city, and what we can make. It's not all about bringing things which already exist. We also want to originate and create new work which has its premiere in Birmingham before it goes off around the world.

So where does your interest in the arts stem from?

I didn't have a particularly artistic upbringing but I did have a couple of really amazing experiences at school, where I was taken to see things in my teenage years. I've never looked back.

Do you have a favourite genre?

That's a difficult one, but I think it would have to be dance.

Has being involved in the arts ever given you a desire to perform yourself?

No, not really. Anyone who's seen me perform knows that that wouldn't be a very happy experience. I leave it to the people with the skill. I just like watching, and hopefully choosing the right things to share with other people.

What would you consider to be your biggest professional success?

The highlight, certainly of the last few years, has been The Voyage, which was produced by the Hippodrome. I wasn't here then, but I was involved as a Cultural Olympiad organiser. It was a really amazing event in terms of its scale and its ambition, the international artists and the number of local people who were involved. It really was an extraordinary event which, despite the weather, large audiences enjoyed.

And what's presented you with the biggest challenge in your career?

As someone responsible for programming and commissioning work, what I'm really interested in is making sure it's not just existing audiences who get to enjoy what we present but new audiences as well. Also, that people who don't really know that the arts are for them can come along and really get the most out of those experiences. I suppose the biggest challenge has sometimes been breaking through and letting people know about what's going on, and how great it's going to be. Sometimes I think our popular media has very fixed ideas on what the arts are about, and if we could only get past that and tell people how enjoyable and fulfilling

the arts are, we could get bigger audiences and new audiences to see the work.

When I last interviewed Stuart Griffiths, the Hippodrome's Chief Executive, he spoke about his vision of Southside becoming Birmingham's very own Covent Garden. Is that a vision you share?

Absolutely! We did our first Summer In Southside event a couple of weeks ago, where we had a day of outdoor dance in a variety of spaces around the theatre. It really did feel like Birmingham's very own Covent Garden for the hour or two that we were doing it. And, of course, there are many similarities between Southside and Covent Garden - the fact that there are arts venues and organisations based here, and the fact it's the gay quarter and the Chinese quarter. We've got lots of interesting restaurants and, actually, when we put live performing arts into the spaces - into the squares and on the streets it really is buzzing with atmosphere, with people and with excitement.

What are your plans to build on Summer In Southside?

Next year we'll be looking at doing more of that kind of work. Southside is absolutely where we're focused in terms of planning these weekends of free outdoor arts events. We hope that next year we'll be able to put on an even bigger and bolder programme.

And long term...

I think one of the things, particularly in my area, is what interesting ideas and approaches international artists take. One of the things that I'd really like to do in our programme in Southside is to bring over some of the international companies who are doing fantastic work from not only places like France and Spain - two of the biggest outdoor arts producers in the world - but also from South America and beyond. There's some amazing stuff going on in those places, and we need to see it here, because both artists and audiences who get to see that work get to realise just what's possible, which raises everybody's expectations and aspirations.

Is that not already being done to a certain extent with events like the International Dance Festival?

Yes it is, but I think there's even more interest. In a city like Birmingham, it's inevitable that people are going to be interested in work produced by a whole range of international artists, not least because our population is so international and there's such a wide range of people who live here, each with their own connections overseas. We need to be able to use that, to capitalise on the diversity of Birmingham. The idea of bringing a range of artists that reflect those communities is incredibly exciting.

And finally, Paul, if you weren't in the arts, which profession would you choose?

I've never considered it, because I've never wanted to do anything else, but I guess I'm pretty good at holiday planning. I always seem to be planning friends' trips, giving them advice on where to go, how to get the best deals, who serves the best food and where to go to sample the best arts and culture when they're there. If I could be paid for organising that, I'd be very happy!

Farenheit fires up...

REVIEW

Nothing really matches up to the sheer audacity of a Las Vegas casino. A billion dollar industry, behemoth hotels, glamour, glitz, showbusiness and dry desert heat. Casinos in the UK can't compete, especially given the current economic climate. Nonetheless, I still have a soft spot for them. The likes of Broadway Casino and Genting are bringing the glamour and excitement back to UK gaming and after the recent launch party at Genting Casino on Birmingham's Hagley Road, I decided to make a return visit.

This Genting Casino has recently had a bit of a refurb. Its clientele is not as male-dominated as you'd expect, and the chic new champagne bar & lounge certainly makes the stylish ladies feel at home. Over a glass of chilled

prosecco. I checked out the new Fahrenheit restaurant's bar and grill menu, which featured an eclectic choice of steaks, chicken and seafood dishes, all prepared with some impressively deft touches. The restaurant is a smart addition to the place; boasting muted colours and mood lighting, it's not overtly stylised. The dishes on the menu are another matter; all great works of style and substance. My choice for starter was easy; the seared black pearl scallops served with strawberries, balsamic vinegar and rocket (£8). I love my scallops, but I've never had them served with strawberries before. These certainly didn't disappoint; fresh and meaty, they were beautifully plated and provided a nice contrast of textures and flavours. My specials main was the

roasted rump of English lamb with wild garlic

mashed potato and red wine jus (£18). The meat was perfectly cooked, and sat on a throne of the creamiest mash, the dish prettily decorated with purple pansies. A hearty portion that was immensely satisfying.

Dinner was rounded off with a nice slice of clementine & coconut cheesecake with gingernut crumb (£5). Great food, well priced and in nice surroundings. Looks like Genting's new restaurant has found a winning formula. Anita Champaneri

Italian flavour at Steakhouse

If memory serves me correctly, the restaurant which was previously located in the premises of the Buffalo Steak House was a rather dingy establishment, where waiters would appear out of the darkness to greet you. What a transformation! White walls, vivid turquoise contrasts, bright lights, dazzling white tablecloths and a well-stocked bar at the far end (which had presumably always been there, but I'd never noticed it before).

We were seated at a lovely table in the window, from where we could people-watch while perusing a menu which had a decidedly Italian flavour to it. That said, it was then explained to us that the menu shouldn't be taken too literally. The Buffalo Steak House has been open for four months now, and some meals which haven't proved popular have been replaced



with alternative choices. All suppliers are said to be local, and where supplies have been difficult to obtain, more readily available replacements are sourced. So you need to ask the staff for up-to-date information about what's on offer.

For starters, my wife had beautifully cooked and well-presented baby asparagus with a delicious hollandaise sauce. She was very pleased with her choice. I went for the pork ribs in a sticky barbecue sauce. The sauce was delicious and the pork fell off the bones. The portion was generous, which meant I had to leave some for fear of filling up prematurely!

For mains, I tried a Buffalo Steak Special, which was absolutely delicious - wonderfully tender and tasty sirloin in a deliciously creamy white wine sauce. My wife had a fillet steak with pepper sauce, and a side of fries. We shared the chips, which were hand-cut and perfectly cooked. Both meals were served with roasted veg, which was delightful. Again, the fillet steak was perfectly cooked, tender and tasty. Unfortunately, the desserts didn't quite match up to the starters and steak. The baked cheesecake was slightly overdone, a little dry, and served with a chocolate sauce which didn't enhance it. The sticky toffee pudding with custard, however, was absolutely the right choice. Fantastic! We chose a Merlot to go with our meal, which was full and fruity, great value and a great accompaniment.

Our opinion of the Buffalo Steak House is largely good. Staff, excellent; ambiance, excellent; food, good; value for money, good. The main thing that a steak house needs to get right is the steak, and this it did. Ac-



cording to the menu, the steak is locally sourced and hung for twenty-eight days, and it tastes all the better for it. They try to serve it not as good pub grub, with onion rings and peas, but as a better quality meal, with more imaginative sides.

Will we go back again? Yes. Probably to

Will we go back again? Yes. Probably to enjoy their pre-theatre menu before seeing a show at the nearby Theatre Severn.
